Tourist Information Centre – under new management

As reported in the spring edition of BTC News, Aylesbury Vale District Council has now withdrawn funding for the town's much-used Tourist Information Centre in The Old Gaol. This is particularly unfortunate given the level of help provided by AVDC when the TIC was established. The Town Council have met with the staff and agreed with them that it will be "business as usual" under the new regime, which will continue its links with AVDC's Leisure & Culture Team, which looks after tourism in the Vale.

This means that advice about tourist and other facilities in our area (and beyond) will continue to be available. Theatre tickets and National Express trips can still be booked. Enquiries about local bus services will continue to be answered, and timetables will continue to be available. Local organisations can continue to advertise their events in the vestibule, and families and businesses seeking to move to the area can still obtain valuable information.

Buckingham's growth now uncertain...

In the spring edition of BTC News, we told you about the work we were doing in respect of Aylesbury Vale **District Council's Local Development Framework Core Strategy.**

This was going to be the district council's proposal for future growth in the Vale, including Buckingham, up to 2026. The district council's proposals were formally presented to the government-appointed Inspector over several weeks, and Town Councillors attended on several days to ensure that Buckingham-specific issues were fully represented.

Since then, the Inspector announced that he was unconvinced by some of the AVDC proposals, then the new coalition government scrapped the South East Plan which had imposed the extraordinarily high housing targets incorporated in the Core Strategy. The government has since followed this up by saying that they favoured a "bottom up" approach to planning, where the wishes of local communities are paramount. As a consequence, AVDC has asked the Secretary of State for permission to withdraw the Core Strategy – and it is expected that he will agree. So where does this leave Buckingham?

Firstly, planning consent has already been given for around 1,200 new homes in the town. Over 300 of these are either built, or are being constructed. Planning consent has been given to about 860 others. including the massive development south of the by-pass. The Core Strategy had implied increased housing numbers that the Town Council considered wildly excessive, and it was not clear whether all or some of these were included in the 1,200. We feared a possible increase over and above that figure, and with no guarantees for adequate infrastructure to support such growth.

Secondly, AVDC's only remaining longterm development plan is out of date, and does not include all currently agreed developments. So they will have to devise a new plan. What this will have to include is unclear as government guidance is still awaited. It is likely, however, to have two main features:

- town and parish councils being asked what development (if any) they want and evidence-based justification for these choices
- possible financial incentives to accept certain levels of development, and penalties (such as the loss of some local services) if there is no development.

Planning consent cannot be rescinded. so we will eventually have 1,200 new homes. The absence of a Core Strategy means that the Vale is open to developers to apply for planning permissions on an unstructured and ad-hoc basis. As such applications cannot be declined without good reason, new-builds could spread across the Vale in an uncontrolled manner and without regard to actual needs, and possibly without adequate supporting infrastructure.

The battle to secure planned and integrated growth to Buckingham looks set to continue.

The Precept is the amount that the Town Council asks Aylesbury Vale District Council, the Council Tax Billing Authority, to collect on our behalf from the Council Tax payers of Buckingham. It is used to fund the services and activities of the Town Council.

The Town Council's Precept for 2010/11 was set at £523,000 which resulted in a Council Tax Bill of £121.46 per year at Valuation Band D (£2.34 per week per household). This was a reduction of 0.1% on the amount charged in 2009/10.

The Aylesbury Vale Shortfall is part-year funding for our Tourist Information Centre, and a contribution towards the Festival Fortnight, previously paid for by the district council but withdrawn by them from this year.

The Balance for 2010/11 includes £327,209 which has been earmarked for a specific project which may be spent in the current financial year.



Town Council Office Extension Cancelled

Plans to extend the existing office space, as well as providing a community room which could double as a Council Chamber, and additional public toilets have been halted after running into seemingly insurmountable problems. As reported in the summer BTC News, these problems concerned uncertainties over some rights of way, which were compounded by landowner delays in responding to correspondence. This is regrettable, particularly given the amount of time and money expended over the last few years.

Because the present office is cramped and unsuitable, thoughts are now turning to moving the office staff to more suitable purpose-built accommodation.

One possibility is the Buckingham Centre in Verney Close, where easy access by the public would still be possible. Other options are also being examined.

It is unlikely, however – particularly in the present economic climate – that the community room or public toilets will be realised in the near future.

Car Parking

It's not the Town Council's fault!

Nevertheless, you have complained to us in large numbers about the district council's changes to Cornwalls Meadow Car Park, and their introduction of charges at Western Avenue and the new Stratford Fields Car Parks as well as Cornwalls Meadow. All of your complaints have been passed on to them, and we have also raised them at meetings. As a result, a number of further changes are awaited, including new permanent signage, a vision mirror at a blind corner, and highlighting of the new kerbing.

You also raised problems caused by the much-increased on-street parking resulting from the introduction of car park charges. These will be fully addressed during an extensive study of parking and town centre access that the Town Council has commissioned, which is due to commence in November.

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Band Jam a major hit!

The traditional curtain-call on the summer holidays, Band Jam, enjoyed another hugely successful day on Sunday 29
August. Live music in the town centre was again provided without charge.
Headline band Horseman Shakes and the Draymen, supported by several other bands including Dirty
Youth, Progression and Baedecker, demonstrate the amount of talent that abounds in our area. The Town Council received many accolades for this year's event, and are already beginning preparations for next year.


