THERE'S TOO MUCH FOR THE YOUNGSTERS TO DO IN BUCKINGHAM ...!

The early summer saw your Town Council and its numerous partners combining to arrange a series of events to keep our younger citizens occupied during the summer. Working with county and district councils, Thames Valley Police, local youth clubs and many other partners, combined funding enabled us to provide an increased range of opportunities and activities this year.



For our younger children, we again invested in AVDC's **Play Around the Parishes** – a series of fun activities including bouncy castles, arts & crafts, giant games, circus skills, soft play – and more! These were scheduled for Chandos Park on three afternoons in July and August, with an alternative venue at Grenville School if it turned out wet.

For older children, we were able to plan basketball sessions with a qualified coach. These occupied several weeks at both Multi Use Games Areas (MUGAs) in Chandos Park (for ages 8 to 12) and Bourton Park (for ages 13+). The Bourton Park MUGA saw the everpopular football coaching over four weekly sessions, with two of the sessions including players from MK Dons imparting their skills to tomorrow's hopefuls. The involvement of the Dons players was yet another spin-off event leading up to the annual *Buckingham Big Day* match at Stadium MK.

We always try to spread these events around, and this year arranged for Kwik cricket and Tuffs sessions to be held at Embleton Way.

Once again, the hugely popular Bungee Run inflatable was booked and, because feedback from many youngsters had indicated a liking for competitive stuff, an inflatable Gladiator Tournament was added – both of these attractions were in Chandos Park during the early evening.

Given the popularity of last year's mural painting, and despite the difficulty of obtaining a graffiti artist, we planned to run sessions to smarten-up the skate park boards – seen as particularly important as AVDC have deferred their planned refurbishment of this popular and well-used facility until 2016.

But it wasn't all frenetic activity – once again, we scheduled a music event in the Skate Park during an afternoon/early evening.

So – it was sport and fun for all the younger townsfolk during what we hoped, at the time of writing, would be a long hot summer.

All these events cost money, and so we are particularly grateful to all of our partner organisations that contributed to enable these events to take place.

SPOTLIGHT ON COMMUNITY GRANTS

Buckingham Town Council supports a number of organisations in the town with grants to aid them in providing facilities and services for the people of the town. In this and our previous issue, we have put a spotlight on community grants recipients, so they can say what they are using the grants for.

Buckingham Parish Church – St Peters and St Pauls Church (£1,000)

This important project will see changes made to the church building to improve its facilities for the use of the community. Part of the project will see an extra toilet being installed, as with so many people coming in to use our fine historic building, existing facilities are woefully inadequate. We are also completely refurbishing our 100-year-old organ, so it can be used for concerts and other community performances.

Friends of The Old Gaol Museum (£500)



Each year associations in Buckingham are invited to apply for a grant, from Buckingham Town Council, towards their projects that benefit the people of our town.

In November 2013 we asked for £500 to help towards the children's activity sessions in Buckingham Old Gaol, these are held during each school holiday and are run and organised by the museum volunteers. The good news came through that our application had been agreed and that we could look forward to receiving a cheque in May 2014.

We immediately set up a working party to arrange the activities for 2014/2015, with increased competition from other local establishments we felt we needed to improve and change them.

This grant allowed us to arrange a visit during the May half-term from owl expert Tony Hewitt of Owls to Behold with a talk and 9 owls. This was very popular; tickets sold out early and 50 children had a fantastic hands-on session with owls alongside 'owl crafts'. During the summer local archaeology experts were in the museum with activities and lots of information. This began with a full day on 25th July as part of the Festival of Archaeology and continued around the museum during the school summer holiday period. More use of the grant will be made when Dr Duck, a children's magician, is set to visit on Wednesday 29th October from 1.30-3.30pm. Again this will be a ticketed event. Extra craft equipment will now be bought and planning for next year will be exciting!

Buckingham Youth Clubs Ltd (£5,000)



I write on behalf of our Management Committee, Staff who help to run our Youth Clubs and the Young People that use them. Since taking over the running of the Youth Clubs and the Youth Centre from Bucks County Council we have increased the number of Young People using the Youth Centre facilities and attending our Club nights.

We cater for all Secondary School ages and regularly see between 90 and 100 Young People per week. In addition we are able to rent out the Youth Centre to pay for the running of the building but we still have to find around £25,000 per annum to pay for Staff and Youth Club running costs. The recent grant from Buckingham Town Council is therefore extremely welcome.

The Town Council has been behind us from day one and we would not have got off the ground without their support and continuing BTC support for our charity will be crucial in this regard. Our grateful thanks to BTC!

Buckingham West End Bowls Club (£500)

Buckingham West End Bowls Club (Est'd. 1910) can be found along the Brackley Road (entrance opposite the cemetery gates) where bowlers of all standards are welcome. However, the clubhouse which is used throughout the year by bowlers, social members and local groups is sadly in decline. In recent years, members have been tirelessly fundraising to enable them to demolish the current wooden building and to replace it with one fit for the 21st Century.



However, whilst funds have to be set aside for a new building, the green still has to be maintained at a cost of several thousand pounds a year. The club is extremely grateful to Buckingham Town Council for making an award towards this maintenance, which enables the continuation of the game of bowls and brings in numerous bowlers from the town and visitors from Milton Keynes, Aylesbury, and the surrounding villages.

Youth Project

1940's Dance

The highlight of the Fringe Week was the 1940's Dance to commemorate the 70th anniversary of the D-Day landings.

The community centre was decorated with red, white and blue bunting, table top Union flags and wartime memorabilia, as well as camouflage netting, which was on loan from Sue & Gavin Jones, who have the army surplus stall on the Saturday market, and a large Union flag which dated back to the 1940's, which was loaned to us by Russell, the Town Crier. The camouflage netting and Union flag provided the back drop for the band.

People had been encouraged to dress up and it was good to see that some of the Councillors that attended had. The female vocalist with the band voted for the Best Dressed Male, which went to Deputy Town Clerk, Chris Robson, who was an evacuee, and a lady from Brackley was voted Best Dressed Female by Sticky Wicket. Her whole outfit dated back to the 1940's.

Comedy Night – Jeremy Hardy

The last day of the Fringe Week saw almost 200 people entertained by Comedian Jeremy Hardy, who is best known for his work on Radio 4, notably on News Quiz.



As well as the regulars who have supported the Comedy Nights for the last 3 years, there were again people who had not been to one of our comedy nights before.

As well as the above events, there was also the Buckingham Civic Day, and comedian Aidan Goatley was live at The Film Place.



The County Council's Local Area Forum (LAF) has several priorities that have been agreed by Buckingham and the 35 surrounding parishes in North Bucks for 2014, and, following recent petitions and complaints, one of these includes onstreet parking in the town centre.

Earlier this year, the LAF's chairman, Cllr. Warren Whyte, set up a working group comprising County, District and Town Councillors to review the situation of on-street parking in the town centre. The group met several times in May to consider a range of existing issues, together with several written submissions from the public, received in response to articles in the *Buckingham Advertiser*.

The working group arranged a public meeting in the community centre at the end of June, and good attendance resulted in good spirited debate about the various options. Several suggestions reached consensus, and the working group re-convened during the summer to agree its recommendations to the following LAF meeting. Hopefully, some limited funding will be agreed to implement the changes (which includes statutory consultation, legal work to create the new traffic orders and signage and lining to implement them). Possible changes that gained support at the public meeting included the relaxation of the hours of operation (9am – 5pm, rather than 8am – 6pm, which would give more flexibility for residents) and altering the short-stay to 30 minutes instead of 1 hour, to provide more capacity for those only popping into town to visit the bank, post office, chemist and library for example – and remaining free. Removing the loading bay outside of the Old Gaol, and creating a few more spaces was a popular suggestion. Several calls for residents' permits were discussed, though the public meeting was perhaps not guite as supportive of the option once the details of potential schemes were highlighted. However, the option was not discounted, and the working group has been looking at this in more detail as the knock-on effects (and cost to residents) are not insignificant.

While off-street parking was not within the scope of the working group, as this is owned by the District Council, it was noted that long-term parking capacity is an issue for commuters and residents in the conservation area, and the public meeting urged land owners in the town centre to consider how they may be able to assist in creating additional long-term and resident parking capacity.



BUCKINGHAM 2031: NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

Regular readers will know that your Town Council has been developing the Buckingham Neighbourhood Development Plan over many months. The consultations have been extensive with residents, developers and all interested parties. There have been statutory guidelines to follow at every stage and we are now in what we hope will be the run up to the referendum sometime early in the New Year. Both Town Councillors and officers have worked hard on the project and we all hope the vote will back the plans made on behalf of the town. You will be hearing more before too long.

In the meantime, we thought it would be interesting and stimulating to invite the young people (under 16) of the town to tell us some more about their hopes for Buckingham 20 years from now. How do you want Buckingham to be different in 2031? What do you think will have changed? What do you want to change? Imagine yourself 20 years older, how do you want your adult life to be made richer by living in Buckingham? When you are older, what do you want to see happening in the town?
