Project Street Life (PSL) provides a place for the youth of Buckingham to

come and enjoy the company of others in a safe and supportive environment. PSL meets at Lace Hill Sports and Community Centre on Fridays from 7pm – 9pm and is open for those in years 5 - 11. Weekly activities include Pool, Crafts, Cooking, Music, Drama and Arts. We also run activity days and residential trips. We are a registered charity, funded through generous donations from individuals and organisations, as well as fund-raising events and grant applications. using our town markets, recycling more, and supporting the many voluntary organisations that do so much for the community, which was particularly noticeable during the pandemic when so many went above and beyond to help others.

During my time as Deputy Mayor, I hope that I can help raise awareness of our amazing range of organisations and charities that are an important part of our local town life.

Community Care North Bucks is a local charity run by volunteers, meeting the needs of the local community as follows:



- Adult Carers Support Group: improving the quality of life for unpaid adult carers by providing a network for friendship and support.
- Young Carers Support Group: providing services that improve the quality of life and opportunities for young carers, including fun, friendship, support, advice and personal development.
- Open House, a support group for ex-carers, as they move on from their caring role, and for people who live on their own.
- Hospital Car Service transports patients from their homes to their appointments and provides support throughout the visit.

Ruth also chaired the Community Plan Environment Group, whose project was taken on board as the Circular Walk, and the Buckingham Community Wildlife Project. She served as Mayor four times and raised thousands for Charities through fundraising events.

COUNCIL CHAMBER BOOKINGS

The newly renovated Buckingham Town Council Chamber is now available for hire.

The Chamber, which is opposite Waitrose and conveniently situated just up from Cornwalls Meadow car park, has been converted to one large bright room with a small kitchen area and access to a disabled toilet. The kitchen has a kettle, sink and a small fridge.

The main feature of the Chamber is a large historic wooden table which has been used



by the Town Council for decades. Up to 17 people can be seated comfortably round it making this an ideal venue for face to face meetings as well as small group education and training sessions.

The room is fully air conditioned and modern energy saving radiators keep it nice and warm on cold days. There is a hearing loop and use of two huge Prowise touch screens can be arranged. The screens work in tandem with a 'Logitech Meet' conferencing camera with a second remote microphone offering excellent quality audio. This system is fully compatible with programs such as Zoom, Microsoft Teams and YouTube.

ANTI-LITTERING CAMPAIGN

This past year parks and green spaces have become more important to us all, and Buckingham Town Council has received requests from residents and community groups asking how best they can get involved in safely clearing any litter they find while out and about.

When you're dealing with someone else's rubbish the best way to clear up litter is with litter pickers. Keeping the litter at a distance from your body can protect you from broken edges and unwanted germs. To help give everyone access to litter pickers, the Town Council has introduced Buckingham's first **#QuickLitterPick** point.

This covered cage in Bourton Park contains five individual litter pickers and a supply of bin liners and can be accessed by anyone with the code for the lock. You can ask for the code by calling the Town Council Office or Buckingham Tourist Information Centre during opening hours.



Cllr. Sue Hetherington told us: "The **Quick Litter Pick** was easy to use and we had really positive reactions from the people we met while using the litter pickers. Everyone was keen to have a go! This project was originally started with previous Chair of the Environment Committee Ruth

Newell; I'd like to send her a big thank you."

In fact, this year the Town Council has introduced multiple schemes to help prevent litter; including a recycling themed poster contest with Bourton Meadow Primary School, wildflower information

wildflower information boards, that are located on the junior play area railings in Bourton

Park, and wildflower art contest with local artist Fiona Hancock, with prizes provided by Buckinghamshire Recycles. Celebrating the beauty of our local parks, the wildflowers, and wildlife supported by them is an important part of encouraging park users to love, respect and protect our green spaces.

GARDEN OF REST

Buckingham Town Council is building a new Garden of Rest at Brackley Road Cemetery for the interment of Cremated Remains. It is now open for use in order to provide space for ashes interment at the cemetery for years to come. However, even though the main ground work is complete, planting of flowers and shrubs will take place this winter.

The new Garden of Rest will have in the region of 350 plots and will be similar in style to the existing Garden of Rest with asphalt paths to ensure accessibility and gravel beds for the burial plots. The area will also include spaces for memorial benches and a litter bin. This will be a great addition to the Brackley Road Cemetery and become a peaceful area for remembrance.
