

The Changing Face of Buckingham...Part 2


It's been another busy few months for planning. The debate rages on about the changes the government are making but we're doing our best to make sure we're prepared. You read in the last newsletter that Buckingham is a 'Front-Runner' for Neighbourhood Planning, well now we're seeing the results with our draft "Sustainability Appraisal Scoping Report" – the first in the country to be published (as far as we're aware!)

As ever, we need you to feedback on the report to make sure we're heading in the right direction for Buckingham.
You can find copies in the library, on our website and on Aylesbury Vale's website. If all this sounds a bit complicated, don't worry – there's a plain English version available and we want as many people as possible to get involved. There are a lot of issues we hope to tackle: growth of the university, employment prospects, housing

employment prospects, housing and allotment space to name just a few, so if you have any thoughts on what the report says about these, let us know.

One other thing to look out for is the "Development Scheme" for Buckingham. This is basically a timetable for all the

various plan-making that's going on in the town so you know who is doing what and what the procedure is. We know there's a lot of frustration about recent development in



so one final point to stress is that planning cannot change what has already happened or is happening. What it can do though is make the future more certain so that more controversy is avoided. Our main objective is to manage Buckingham's development for a better future, something hopefully everybody can get behind.

Quiet Buckingham

Unwelcome noise can damage lives and communities. It can be the car alarm at 3 in the morning, a loud animal, a noisy party or those faint hissing noises from the earphones of the person next to you on the bus.

At the Town Council, we want everyone in Buckingham to live fulfilling lives, untroubled by noise from neighbours, traffic or workplaces.



As part of our efforts to work with you to achieve this, we have compiled this short list of ideas and actions:

- Consider your neighbours. Do you make any noise that could be upsetting to them?
- Get to know your neighbours. Talking about noise and its impacts is one of the best ways of avoiding any conflict.
- Inform your neighbours. If you are going to have a party (for example), let them know or even invite them.
- If your neighbours are making too much noise, talk with them.
- If you have tried that or else feel you cannot talk with them, get some help from an independent person. (If you go to www.direct.gov.uk and type in noise to their search box, some very useful links come up).
- Again if you have tried that, contact
 Environmental Health at AVDC
 (01296 585605) as they are the people
 who deal with noise (NOT the police)
- You may need to keep a record of the noise to provide evidence, if it goes that far.

Remember, your neighbours may not just be the people living either side of you.

The Queens Diamond Jubilee

Beacons, street parties and memory books!

2012 marks the Queens Diamond Jubilee and preparations are under way for Buckingham's celebrations. On 4th June a beacon will be lit in Bourton Park between the hours of 10pm and 10:30pm after the Queen has lit the national beacon in Central London. It is hoped that there will be 2,012 beacons lit across the country to commemorate the event. A special book which is being compiled by the Pageant Master is to be presented to the Queen after the Jubilee, listing all the towns and villages that took part. Buckingham's beacon has already been registered with the Pageant Master for this event, for inclusion in the book.

Buckingham Town Council wants to know what you were doing on the day of the Coronation in 1953. Did you attend a street party, were you lucky enough to own a TV and watch the coronation on it? A **Memory Book** is being compiled with memories of what local residents were doing on the day of the Coronation. The book will go on display in the library and the Old Gaol and copies will be available for sale.

Awards were handed out by the Mayor, Cllr Mike Smith, and MP John Bercow to the best floats and walkers, which included Buckingham Library, The Royal British Legion, Maids Moreton Scouts and The Young Carers. The parade was enjoyed by everyone, and was said to be better than ever!




Memorial Testing

Buckingham has a distinguished historic cemetery that is over 150 years old which Buckingham Town Council is responsible for maintaining. As part of its commitment to providing an attractive and safe cemetery for its visitors the Town Council has started to assess the safety of memorials in the cemetery.



The Town Council is going to undertake a programme of memorial safety testing in the cemetery which will be done in an appropriate and sensitive manner. This will be an on-going process and will be done on a yearly basis with all of the memorials being tested over a 5 year period. The holder of the grave deed is ultimately responsible for the maintenance of the memorial; a list of any unsafe memorials will be made available on the Town Council's website and at the cemetery. The council would like to stress that if any unsafe memorials are found they will not be laid flat unless there is no alternative to making them temporarily safe until they can be repaired.





The Development of Christ's Hospital Almhouses

One of the landmarks of Buckingham town centre is the Christ's Hospital almshouses, at the corner of Verney Close and Market Hill.

These were originally built for the relief of 6 poor widows (of good character) born in the Borough of Buckingham. Over the years this has been extended to cover any single, deserving individuals.

They were last rebuilt in Victorian times when the residents were happy to have a roof over their

heads. But over the years the standards have risen and they need making into individual one bedroom flats with proper kitchen, bathroom, toilet etc provision.

In addition the building is in bad structural shape, with several damp problems. Architect plans have been drawn up, costed, and planning permission has been gained from AVDC to completely rework the existing building.

The total cost of this project is £774,000. The small reserves held by Buckingham General Charities, who own the building, and a mortgage of £420,000 leaves

a shortfall of £340,000. A grant from the HCA (Housing & Communities Agency, a Government Quango) is being negotiated.

Unfortunately the mechanism by which the money has been granted is somewhat complex and long drawn out so we will not be able to start the work until 2013. We can then look forward to having much improved accommodation for the 6 residents.





Our third Green Fair will be held at Buckingham Community Centre on Saturday 17 March.

If you are interested in reducing your carbon footprint and saving money, this will present an opportunity to learn more about solar energy, photo-voltaic electricity production, reduced "food miles" and much, much more. This will be an ideal opportunity to speak to companies and businesses involved in the broader "green" industry sector. With rising energy prices, what better time is there to "Go Green!"

Admission will be free, and the Fair will be open from 10.00am to 4.00pm.

The Fair is being organised by the Green Buckingham Group, which serves to raise awareness and encourage local adoption for a more environmentally-friendly lifestyle. Its members are drawn from the Town Council, the University of Buckingham, the Buckingham & Winslow Advertiser, and others with an interest or involvement in environmental issues.

But it's not just a matter of tea, coffee and bananas. Clothing can be ethically sourced at a reasonable price, and this must surely be better than relying on cut-price produce from exploitative sweatshops. Even furniture can be made from sustainably-sourced materials.

One of the largest "businesses" in town currently on the verge of gaining recognition is the University of Buckingham, both for its foodstuffs and beverages and a range of branded clothing.

What it means for the average shopper is that, by purchasing goods bearing the FairTrade logo, they are helping to support sustainability and reduce poverty while at the same time being assured of buying a quality product. Could we urge you to give FairTrade products a try, if you haven't already done so?

Buckingham Twinning

Buckingham has been twinned with **Mouvaux**, a town on the edge of Lille in northern France, for several years now. In fact this year will be the 10th anniversary of the relationship with Mouvaux.

To celebrate the 10th anniversary of being twinned with Mouvaux, they are sending a choir to Buckingham in March who, together with the Lenborough Singers, will perform in the Parish Church. It is also hoped to plant a tree to commemorate the occasion and to name the small hall in the community centre after our twinned town.

For many years Mouvaux has been twinned with the German town **Neukirchen-Vluyn**, which is in the very west of Germany between the Ruhr Valley and the Dutch border. Neukirchen-Vluyn has participated in a youth football tournament between our own Mortonville and Mouvaux; and the Royal Latin School also has a student exchange with them. To build on this burgeoning relationship, the Town Council has recently agreed to enter into a "friendship" with Neukirchen-Vluyn.
