A Message from Mayor Ruth

The Town Council is working hard on the development of the **Neighbourhood Development Plan;** following the wide consultation we are now looking at all the sites suggested for development and are evaluating them.

On 4 March I enjoyed an invitation to **Buckingham School** to the opening of their **Centre for Further Education** and science laboratories, and was pleased to hear about the increased and well deserved popularity of the school. I am also pleased to support the **Royal Latin School** in their **600 campaign** to raise funds for their new Science block and laboratories which will give the school much needed space and teaching areas.

We have exciting events for you this summer with the Town Council's **Fringe**Week entertainments running from 15 to 23 June, and then the British Ecological Society Centenary Fund wildlife events that are running from the end of June to the beginning of August here in Buckingham; look out for the publicity.

We had our **Annual Town Meeting** on 22 March when the Town Council reports to the residents of the Town and answers any questions. It was pleasing to note that all the concerns expressed were the responsibilities of other authorities. As a tree warden and keen environmentalist I've shared the horror of many at the



destruction of mature trees along the verge of the by-pass near to the new development at Lace Hill. We will be seeking the replacement of mature trees in the new landscaping being undertaken as part of the road widening around the roundabout.

I am pleased to have been chosen by the Town Council to represent them as Mayor of Buckingham for a further year, and thank my family, **Robert, Rachel** and **Lara** for their on-going support.

I finally want to take the opportunity to thank all our Town Council staff and also our Town Councillors who put in many hours on a voluntary basis to try and improve things here in Buckingham for the benefit of us all.

The Town Council has appointed a new **Town Plan Officer**, **Sheena McMurtrie**, who will be aiding in the production of the Buckingham Neighbourhood Development Plan. The first stage of consultation on the Neighbourhood Plan has now finished.

We will be processing the results and preparing the plan between now and November. At the same time we are also looking at where

housing, employment, leisure and other facilities can be placed in the town. As a result the Town Council will develop a number of preferred options for where development should take place. Once these have been identified the Town Council will consult you to see which you prefer.

In April the Town Council has agreed a number of Interim Policies to guide planning applications in the period until the Buckingham Development Neighbourhood Plan is adopted. If you wish to view the policies they can be accessed through our website.

The Town Council would like to thank all of the stakeholders who have contributed to the process so far including the University of Buckingham and the Buckingham Society.

MK CREDIT UNION local, ethical, affordable savings and loans

Credit Unions are locally based "not-for profit" financial cooperatives. They offer savings and loans to members at affordable rates and all members' savings are fully protected by the Government Financial Services Compensation Scheme.

MK Credit Union is based in Milton Keyes, but has recently extended its coverage into MK18. This expansion is part of a coordinated effort to ensure that all residents of Buckinghamshire have a local Credit Union that they can join.

Savings The first contact anyone will have with Credit Union is when they set up a savings account into which they can pay either in cash via a PayPoint card, by standing order, or by salary deduction if their employer has signed up.

Rents With the agreement of their landlord, members can have their Universal Credit or salary paid into a special Credit Union account, the rent is then paid directly to the landlord and anything remaining is transferred to the member's account for their use. This will be invaluable to both tenants and landlords when, under the Universal Credit scheme, all benefits will be rolled into one and payable only to the claimant. It will certainly reduce the potential for tenants to get into rent arrears.

Loans Only when someone has been saving on a regular basis for at least 3 months will they be eligible to apply for a loan. This is planning for a rainy day (eg when the washing machine or the car breaks down). The member can only then take out a loan having demonstrated their ability to save on a regular basis.

A constant problem facing the emergency services are prank or inappropriate 999 calls. Partly in response to this and partly to make contacting your NHS and police services easier, new numbers have been introduced:



101 is the number to call when you want to contact your local police when it's less urgent than a 999 call. 101 is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year (calls to 101, from both landlines and mobile networks, cost a flat 15 pence per call).



111 is the new way of getting advice about NHS / health matters available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year (calls are free from landlines and mobile phones).

999 is for calls which require an emergency response such as telling the police about a crime currently underway, a serious accident needing medical assistance, or a fire of course.

THE BUCKINGHAM RAILWAY WALK CONSERVATION GROUP

Tucked away just off the busy A421 peace and quiet descends as a defined pathway takes you off in a north westerly direction on a route running alongside the old track bed of the railway branch line which served Buckingham until the late 1960s. Passing through wooded embankments, open sunny glades, alongside a springfed pond the path continues past the remains of the station platforms and further still over 2 bridges, allowing elevated views over the older parts of Buckingham and a community orchard. Onwards with St. Rumbold's Well on the left, finally ending at the Tingewick Road. (In total, just over 1mile). In 2003 the site was designated as a wildlife area and as such remains untouched by development and is managed with wildlife in mind.

The walkway is used by people for a quiet traffic free route to walk to the shops, work or school, for jogging, cycling or just

a place to go for a stroll. Others find a sheltered sunny spot to sit and read. For those who have time to linger and remain quiet, you may be treated to the sight of a wily fox or glimpse a muntjac deer. Whatever the time of year, there are always opportunities to discover and enjoy the countless varieties of native wildlife which can be found here.

At this time of year, visitors can hear sweet summer birdsong. The birds have made use of the bird boxes placed at intervals in the woodland, where they built their nests to raise a new brood in the spring. Frogs and toads congregate in the pond and muddy shallows, their distinctive croaking clearly heard. After a cold winter and late spring, the trees have burst into life, their fresh green leaves forming a canopy overhead. Watch out for all the summertime flowers as they colour and add dazzle to the verges and glades.



Every season holds its magic for this short but long one mile stretch!

The Buckingham Railway Walk
Conservation Group is a small group of
volunteers who have been working with
the landowners of the Railway Walk
(Buckingham Town Council) and the
Scenic Walk (Aylesbury Vale District
Council) for the last 6 years. We really
enjoy working in this unique setting and
take pleasure in helping to ensure the site
continues to attract and support a variety
of wildlife and is also a delightful and

interesting place for the local community to spend time.

We meet regularly on the first Saturday of each month in the University Car Park at the top of Station Road at 10am. Activities continue until about 2pm and we provide tools, safety equipment and light refreshments. New volunteers are warmly welcomed. In addition to this the Council gives long term grants to Buckingham Community Centre, Buckingham Old Gaol and The Film Place. As well as grants the Council also aids charities and other community organisations in a number of ways including advertising events, providing a venue for meetings and by campaigning for issues and changes with other authorities. The Town Council grants process starts again in October.

WHAT HAS YOUR COUNCIL DONE FOR YOU?

The Environment, Property and Health Committee

looks after the Council's "estate", which comprises **Chandos Park, Bourton Park,** the **Cemetery** (including the house and chapels), the **Railway Walk** and other open spaces. Apart from ensuring that these areas are properly maintained, we have continued to work closely with local conservation volunteers and various "friends" groups whose unstinting work helps to maintain and improve these valuable resources and protect the indigenous wild life for us all.

In Bourton Park, **new play equipment**, designed for older children and with inputs from local schools, was opened by our Mayor in mid-February. It is designed to blend in with its woodland surroundings, and will include landscaping and a seating area. Some **picnic benches** and **fencing** have been replaced, including a section of fencing destroyed by vandals during the last bonfire night. There has been further **tree** and **hedge planting**, all mixed native species.

A new **out-flow** has been re-instated in Chandos Park to help alleviate storm water issues. The **CCTV camera** has also been restored, and long overdue **repairs to the path** will be addressed in the Autumn.

In the Cemetery, a new **Garden of Rest** has been laid out, and further burial space has been identified. Some essential **memorial safety testing** has now started, and problems with the East Chapel mean that quite **extensive repair work** is about to be undertaken.

We have also started the process to renovate the base of the **war memorial** adjacent to the parish church, and to replace the surrounding bollards.

The Planning Committee

has been incredibly busy over the last year; not only reviewing **133 planning applications** but also coordinating the **Neighbourhood Development Plan** and reviewing the many forthcoming changes to the planning system.

The Committee keeps a close eye on planning and advertising breaches, particularly when they could impact upon a Listed building or the Conservation Area.

We are currently in conversation with the County Council with regards to a new **strategic transport plan** and a revised and extended **cycle network**.

We were disappointed at the appeal decision regarding the additional houses in Moreton Road, and are pleased that AVDC are challenging the decision at the High Court. We are also concerned about further changes to the proposed Market Hill development, and the lack of retail and affordable housing now being proposed, together with the incomplete nature of Candleford Court and the state it has been left in.

Work continues with the Neighbourhood Plan, with some very well-attended events over the last few months. We are now moving into the more detailed stage of the Plan, so do look out for future events to get involved with, as we want to make sure the plan develops with input from a wide range of people.

The Finance, Administration and Personnel Committee

has overseen the Town Council office and staff, advised and steered the budgets. For the 4th successive year we have not increased the Town Council element of your Council Tax.

To ensure that the Town Council does not experience expensive litigation and undertakes good employment practices the Deputy Town Clerk has worked very hard over the last 12 months to provide the Committee with a number of employment policies. The Council has adopted these and will continue to improve in the coming year.

We will continue to strive to deliver a good service to the people of Buckingham and will be pleased to hear your concerns and thoughts as to how we can deliver the service you want.

The Committee also deals with the hiring out of the **Town Council Chamber.** If you wish to rent out a room which sits 17 around the impressive Town Council table then please contact the Town Council Office. Charges start at £3 per hour.

The Town Centre and Events Committee

along with the staff in the office and particularly our Events Assistant **Amanda Brubaker**, have worked very hard this past year to provide residents and visitors with some wonderful events to attend.

We were able to facilitate the **Olympic Torch** passing through town giving Buckingham a piece of Olympic history and not long afterwards we had the **Queen's Jubilee** celebrations, which ended with the lighting of the beacon in Bourton Park.

The town also enjoys **3 music events each year.** We also fund the **Christmas Parade** and new **Christmas lights** for the town centre and each June there is a packed **Fringe Week.** We have seen many comedians perform at the Old Town Hall through our regular **Comedy Nights** with ticket prices remaining reasonable, but we need your support to keep the event going, so please check our website and Facebook page regularly.

Clir. O'Donoghue led on our youth projects again, where both senior schools work together on a Drama & Art project and the Local Democracy Event, as well as supporting the Youth Council with the Deputy Town Clerk, Anita Simonds.

The Committee has also maintained a good **street market** two days a week through the hard work of Mrs. Simonds, who continues to bring continental markets here for a bit of variety.

Thanks to **Clir. Mahi's** hard work many residents and visitors enjoyed a spectacular **fireworks display** in Bourton Park, which seems to get bigger and better every year!

We also held the first **Harvest Fair** in the cattle pens working in partnership with **Destination Buckingham** and held a **Flood Action Event**.

The Committee's **Vice Chairman, Cllr. Bloomfield** organised the **River Rinses** and **Pancake Race,** and is a great help when the **fair** comes into town.

Buckingham has been a Fairtrade Town since 2007 and this year we aim to renew this status, but we need your help! We have to demonstrate our commitment to Fairtrade by developing greater awareness amongst retailers, caterers, schools, churches, clubs and community groups in and around the town.

So we plan to update and reissue our guide to businesses in the town who support Fairtrade principles, this promotes businesses in Buckingham alongside the message of fair pay and working conditions for all. We would welcome new members to the voluntary Fairtrade Town Steering Group, and also your ideas as to how we can develop Fairtrade more in our town.
