FAIRTRADE STEERING GROUP

Buckingham has been a Fairtrade Town since 2007 and we recently renewed this status and reissued our guide to the businesses in the town who support the Fairtrade principles of fair pay and working conditions for all. More people are becoming aware of the injustices in the food supply chain and also in the manufacture of clothing and are actively participating by buying Fairtrade whenever they can.



The aim of this year's Fairtrade Fortnight was making all bananas fair. Over the past 10 years the typical price of a banana

has halved, while the cost of production has doubled. The Pancake Day lunches after the Town Council's pancake races on 1 March at Church Hill offered Fairtrade banana fillings. Do join us at our Anniversary Event at The Old Gaol from 10am to 12 noon on Saturday 20th September 2014. There will be stalls selling Fairtrade goods and gifts, plus enjoy a cup of Fairtrade coffee or tea and indulge in a homemade cake, baked with Fairtrade ingredients, of course!



Buckingham, Winslow & District Citizens Advice Bureau (£5,000)

The Buckingham, Winslow & District Citizens Advice Bureau is a charity which provides free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to everyone on their rights and responsibilities. Our service aims are:

- To provide the advice people need for the problems they face
- To improve the policies and practices that affect people's lives.



- Maintain our opening hours
- Participate in a county-wide telephone advice service
- Maintain our computer systems and hardware
- Train seven new volunteers advisers

During the last twelve months, the bureau dealt with approximately 4500 different client contacts (either drop-ins, appointments, home visits or telephone advice), and we gave advice on about 7600 separate issues.

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WHAT HAS YOUR COUNCIL DONE FOR YOU?



Buckingham Neighbourhood

Environment, Property and Health Committee

The Committee looks after protecting and improving the town and its environs, and promotes all aspects of community safety and "wellbeing". It keeps an eye on work required to footpaths, pavements, cycleways, roads, waterways, horticultural and arboriculture works, street furniture (seats, planters and waste bins), play areas, and play equipment.

Last year, apart from routine maintenance, improvements to Bourton Park, the Cemetery and the War Memorial were completed. An audit was completed of our green spaces identified where additional work might be needed, and reviewed access for the less able and those with pushchairs.

In Bourton Park, New Homes Bonus money contributed towards a replacement Trim Trail, which will be installed in time for the summer, together with a MUGA on the existing basket-ball court. As part of a youth engagement project last summer, a further picnic bench was repaired, and carved "gate posts" now lead to the re-laid path under the by-pass, where attractive murals were painted on the bridge supports. We continue to look to replacing the otter sculptures. In Chandos Park, improvements to the main entrance path have now been completed.

Although most of our Cemetery is "lawned" for ease of maintenance purposes, it is necessary to test memorial safety. This continues on a planned cycle.

Town Centre & Events Committee

As the name suggests, this Committee runs many – often free – events in the town including competitions like 'Buckingham in Bloom' and also looks after the provision of planters and hanging baskets, and Christmas decorations.

The Comedy Night goes from strength to strength – Mark Steel was a sell-out, and we were very lucky that Paul Chowdhry got a Channel 4 show shortly after we booked him; he is now on a national tour.

We have reinstated the maypole dancing, with the co-operation of local schools, and holding the Pancake Race on a Saturday at the Church enabled us to link with their Saturday morning café, which provided pancakes after the races.

We recently repeated last year's new event, the Food Fair, which was again very wellattended and boosted locally sourced food and drink.

Look out for the Fringe brochure – some old favourites, some new ideas, to suit all ages and tastes.



Planning Committee

The work of the Planning committee continues to consist mainly of the development of the Buckingham Neighbourhood Development Plan (BNDP); and the scrutiny of the many planning applications made in the town of Buckingham.

The BNDP was developing well and we were hoping to present it for the required local referendum at the same time as the European elections in May2014. Unfortunately this will not be possible as a neighbouring parish, that had agreed in writing that Buckingham could speak for a strip of the land in their parish, changed their mind, requiring some small changes to the plan and a further consultation, which is causing delay. There has also been a legal challenge to a Neighbourhood Plan, (in another part of the country) which might affect Buckingham. We are now aiming for September.

The committee reviewed 158 planning applications; the main ones were for the two Sainsbury Supermarkets and the ASDA (now Aldi) food store. Procedural changes in AVDC mean we have had to speak to any plans that we seriously object to.

Finance and Administration Committee

The Finance and Administration committee's work is very much unseen as it takes care of the Town Council's budget and oversees other committee budgets, as in keeping the precept to acceptable levels. We try to ensure that Buckingham residents do not have huge increases in their local tax bill to cope with. Another area we look after is the staff, ensuring they have the tools and support they require to fulfil their role within the Town Council, and that any issues are dealt with promptly and fairly.

We are always happy for our residents to contact us with any problems, suggestions or other matters we can help with and will do our very best to address any concerns our residents may have.

BUCKINGHAM'S ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The Annual Town Meeting was held in Buckingham Community Centre on Wednesday 26th March. This is a meeting for electors of the town to come along and have their views heard on the key issues that affect them. The Town Council welcomed representatives from Aylesbury

Vale District Council (Ms. Aldworth – Director), Buckinghamshire County Council (Mr. Williams – CEO) and the Police (Inspector Davies). There were a number of topics covered at the meeting including descriptions of the work all three Councils have undertaken over the past 12 months. Questions were raised on several issues including planning, street drainage, closing of the AVDC area office in Buckingham, parking on verges, speeding and funding for the improvements to the Swan Pool.

BUCKINGHAM YOUTH COUNCIL ELECTS NEW CHAIR





We need to know about anything that detracts from the visual and developed town landscape, whether it be satellite dishes on cottages, inappropriate replacement windows, garish shop signs or advertising, extensions that betray the original building materials – anything that

IS 20 PLENTY IN BUCKINGHAM?

There is a growing national campaign for 20 mph speed limits to become the default speed limit for all residential roads. Many bodies have come out in favour of this including the Parliamentary Advisory Council for Transport Safety, British Lung Foundation, Town & Country Planning Association, National Federation of Women's Institutes, National Obesity Forum, British Heart Foundation, Royal Institute of British Architects and many more. The arguments for such a speed limit are many and varied. They include:

- Reduction in road casualty numbers and harm from any accidents that do occur
- Safer for all including children, cyclists and tourists, who want to walk a little slower
- Bus passengers and car drivers enjoy a smoother and less stressful ride
- Less fuel is used and the air is cleaner
- Residential roads become more sociable and friendly as people feel safer and it's quieter outside
- Slower speeds help traffic to flow well, with easier merging at junctions
- Better access for all, especially those who have difficulty crossing busy roads.

The question is: do we want Buckingham to have some 20 mph zones?

In the British
Social Attitudes
Survey 2011, 73%
favoured 20mph

limits for residential roads. Only 11% were against. Recent local surveys have found comparable approval levels, including Oxford where their formal consultation on 20mph limits gained a 69% approval.

The Town Council will be considering this option for the town but you don't have to wait for us! Anyone can use the resources on the http://20splentyforus.org.uk website to start a local campaign. Help available includes petition templates, free email addresses, online discussion groups, loan of a speed detector and campaign materials such as stickers & leaflets.

But do write to us as well. We are always keen to hear the views of Buckingham people on this and all other matters.
