EDITORIAL GUIDELINES



BNDP UPDATE



This is the 'house newsletter' of Buckingham Town Council. We have been developing its format over several years, and especially over the last four: tightening up production schedules, its content and the general 'feel' of the newsletter. We thought it would be helpful to publish our editorial guidelines.

- We favour pieces about Town Council activities: past and future. This includes articles about events, policy decisions, markets etc.
- On only very rare occasions do we publish articles from (say) the District or County Councils or other bodies. Usually only if there is space or it is a particularly important matter (such as trying to get more foster carers) do we do this.
- We do use these pages to promote organisations the Town Council supports both in cash and/or kind (such as the recipients of our grants).
- This newsletter is also for stimulating debate about matters in the town that could lead to your Town Council taking action (such as floating the idea of a public performance space in one of our parks).

- This is not the official record of the council's business: that is all contained in the minutes of the council and committee meetings available from the website.
- The lead time of the newsletter, means that it does not carry news as such: please watch our social media or the local newspaper for that more 'live' feed of information.
- Apart from the Mayor's Message, we do not print the names of authors since this is a corporate newsletter. The writers include both councillors and officers.
- We have decided not to carry advertising since

 a) we prefer to remain entirely independent of
 commercial interests and
 b) we don't have the space.
- For your information: each copy (in terms of typesetting, printing and distribution) costs less than 30 pence for it to arrive through your letterbox. This is a 34% reduction from the cost 4 years ago.
- We are always open to feedback on any of the pieces: Buckingham Town Council is your council and we listen to what you say.

The Buckingham Neighbourhood Development Plan is currently being considered by an Independent Examiner who will rule on the Plan at the end of June. If the recommendation is to proceed to a referendum this will likely be held in August or September. The Plan was submitted to AVDC on 10th March and public consultation was undertaken on this version of the Plan until the 23rd April.

Getting the Plan to this stage is only as a result of a fantastic effort by Town Councillors, Officials and Buckingham Residents, both societies and individuals, particularly the Buckingham Society. It is one of the most comprehensive plans yet submitted in the U.K. and regardless of the final outcome of the Referendum to be held, Buckingham should be very proud of this achievement. It is appropriate to mention previous Town Plan Officers, Sam Dix, who undertook the huge task of the Sustainability Appraisal and Scoping Report, which provided such an excellent base for the emerging Plan; and Prerana Parida, who did much at the start of preparing for the Plan itself.

The determination of the Town Council and residents to see this Plan submitted has meant that the regrettable delays caused by external factors; the halt to Neighbourhood Plans in general after a legal challenge brought by developers; and the withdrawal of consent to inclusion of some land by Radcliffe-cum-Chackmore Parish Council; have slowed the process but not dampened the enthusiasm.

Many residents made it known through consultation that more residential development was not wanted in the area, at least not without more employment

opportunities. Not planning to take more homes based on the projected needs of the community, would only lead to opportunistic development in any area available. Central government policy requires positive planning for sustainable development, and the Buckingham Plan must be in conformity with this. This in turn is also not desired by many residents. The Plan will stand alongside AVDC Local Plan (including the emerging AVAP) in determining planning applications for the Buckingham Neighbourhood Development Plan Area – it is not merely an advisory document.

Work in relation to the Plan continues. Concerns expressed about roads and transport are being taken forward from the consultations to those responsible for preparing a Transport for Bucks strategy for the area. A Design and Access Guide for developers is also being undertaken to ensure that the positive characteristics of our historic market town are maintained.

CONSERVATION – MAIDS MORETON AVENUE

The woodland footpath from Stratford Road to Highlands Road and Buckingham Primary School has a long history. On an 1833 map, it goes to Avenue Road, Maids Moreton, and the church. The large trees in the gardens of Villiers Close remain from this section of the walk. Avenue Road is so named after the avenue.


Ed Grimsdale has found that it was informally planted by Rev. Long (Hutton), Rector of Maids Moreton, around 1805, soon after the enclosure of that Parish. On hot afternoons, it became popular as a cool walk from Buckingham to Maids Moreton. It provided pleasant views through trees and hedges over fields to the then small town of Buckingham and up and down the Great Ouse Valley. The photograph shows an Edwardian lady seated on a bench near the top enjoying the view. It is now a wildlife



corridor for nature from the river to the open country to the north east.

Avenue users will have noticed the recent changes to the path commissioned by Bucks CC, aiming to make the Avenue an all-weather route to the primary school. The money only covered a partial job, so work concentrated on the wettest spots. We hope the rest will be treated soon: time will hide the unnatural new edges.

THE HIDDEN TREASURES OF BUCKINGHAM

In the two previous issues we offered you a list of some of the special places and features of Buckingham that we know and love. We had so many they could not all fit, so here is part 3:

- Within easy walking distance of the town centre, Chandos Park has a multi-use games area (MUGA), a children's playground, tennis and bowls clubs and provides the ideal setting for a picnic overlooking the River Great Ouse.
- Originally St John's Hospital, the Chantry Chapel on Market Hill is the oldest building in Buckingham, dating in parts from the 12th century. It was also home to The Royal Latin School for almost 400 years, before they moved to larger premises. The Chantry was passed to the National Trust in 1912 as one of their earliest properties and is now open to the public as a second-hand book and coffee shop.
- The base of our Market Cross, which anciently stood in the Horse Fair, and then for many years marked the site of the church door in the old churchyard, can now be seen in the Old Gaol Museum, where it was relocated for safety in 2000.
- A similarly lost and found Buckingham landmark is the notice quoting the Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam: "I often wonder what the Vintners buy one half so precious as the goods they sell" over what used to be a wine merchant, now the RSPCA shop.
- When Edward VI died in 1553, Buckingham gave its support to Mary Tudor, who in return, on 17th January 1554, issued a royal charter that declared Buckingham a borough and granted a weekly market and an annual fair. This was then followed by another charter in 1684, from Charles II, who established our current market days and the two annual fairs that we still have today. A copy of the 1554 royal charter is located in the Council Chamber.
- The Radcliffe Centre on Church Street, built as a nonconformist church, now part of the University of Buckingham, is a venue for concerts and lectures. The building, which is wheelchair friendly, is named after local MP John Radcliffe and has been recently refurbished. Keep a look out for upcoming concerts and music events.

3rd ANNUAL SPRING FAIR

Organised by Buckingham Town Council, Buckingham's 3rd annual Spring Fair was held on Sunday 19th April in the cattle pens. Amongst the 18 exhibitors were Men in Sheds who brought along some of the bird boxes and other items that they had made. The Master Composter was there to give

> advice on composting and the Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust were signing up new recruits and volunteers. A BBQ was provided by the Scouts who were fund raising for the new Scout hut.

BUCKINGHAM ACTION GROUP – FREE BASKETBALL SESSIONS

In 2012, a multiagency group was set up to co-ordinate activities for young people in Buckingham. The group is made up of representatives from Buckingham Town Council, AVDC, BCC, Thames Valley Police, Project Street Life, Buckingham Youth Centre and the Buckingham NAG. The group initially focused on providing diversionary activities for young people at risk of causing anti-social behaviour and so over the past few years the group have secured funding to run a range of activities for young people aged 11 years and up over the summer holidays, which is where traditionally there is a spike in youth anti-social behaviour calls. Having reviewed the activities run in the past, the group are now looking at setting up recurring activities during term time as well as the school holidays to compliment the current youth offer in the town. Funding is currently being

sought to set up a **boxing club**, summer **basketball** sessions, **American Football** sessions and a **gaming league**. For more information about the group contact either the Town Council or the Communities team at AVDC on 01296 585301.

This summer, **free basketball** sessions for young people are returning to Buckingham. Starting **8th June**, one hour long turn up and play sessions will be taking place on Mondays for 12 weeks. The sessions will be taught by qualified coaches who will bring all the equipment needed. Young people aged 8 – 12 years can attend sessions at Chandos Park at 17.30 and young people aged 13 years upwards can attend sessions at Bourton Park at 18.45.

WHAT DID YOUR COUNCIL ACHIEVE IN 2014/15?

Town Centre and Events Committee



The Committee, along with Council officers, has worked hard

this past year to provide residents and visitors with some

wonderful events. We have continued to run our many annual events, including live music, comedy nights and two River Rinses; which attracted a record number of volunteers. In July, the Council successfully hosted a new 'Dog Awareness' event in Bourton Park, which it has received requests to repeat in 2015.

The Committee has overseen the renewal of pea lights in the Cattle Pens and secured 3 year fixed price contracts for the planters and hanging baskets, ensuring quality displays at long term reasonable costs.

Looking ahead the Committee will be seeking to secure a quality and best value contract for the renewal of the Christmas lights and host a series of new events during June's Fringe Week.

Planning Committee

The Committee has had another busy and successful year, not only reviewing 147 planning applications but also coordinating the Buckingham Neighbourhood Development Plan (BNDP). The Committee's scope has

steadily changed; one of the

main reasons for this has been the reduced number of projects that need planning permission, so during 2014/15 one of the Committees major activities was the BNDP.


Buckingham was an early starter in the Neighbourhood Plan process, following some frustrating delays, outside of the Council's control; the Plan has now been completed and submitted to AVDC. It is now being reviewed by an independent examiner before moving to referendum.

Although enforcement is AVDC responsibility the Committee continues to inform them as to breaches, such as the closed riverside path at Candleford Court. The Committees representations also helped secure a new and improved bus shelter for the town.

Environment Committee

The Committee looks after protecting and improving the town and its environs.

In Bourton Park the long hoped for Trim Trail was installed in time for summer, and a new Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) was opened by our Mayor in August. The Committee also arranged for the replacement of old picnic benches and commissioned a pond survey which will lead to a long-term project for improvements.



In the Cemetery, the Garden of Rest continues to mature nicely and the doors for both chapels have been renewed. While at the church the War Memorial was cleaned up and bollards installed.

Looking forward, plans to refresh the Ken Tagg Play Area are advanced and it is hoped AVDC will refurbish their skate park area.

Resources Committee

The Resource committee's work is largely unseen, taking care of policies, personnel, Council budgets and keeping the precept to acceptable levels. During the past year the Committee has helped the Council ensure it has continued to provide a high quality of service to Buckingham's residents while avoiding a rise in Council Tax for the 5th year running.

The Committee has overseen the creation of a comprehensive Strategic Plan, which forms the basis of the Council's Business Plan. The Business Plan and all financial and policy documents can be found on the Council's website.

We will continue to strive to deliver a good service to the people of

Buckingham and always welcome your thoughts on how we can deliver the quality of services you want.



NEW TOWN COUNCILLORS

Due to boundary changes, there are now four wards in Buckingham, with eight councillors for Buckingham South, seven councillors for Buckingham North and one each for the new wards of Fishers Field and Highlands & Watchcroft – making a total of 17 councillors, the same as before.

Following the election, Buckingham Town Council now has a new councillor:

 Cllr. Mark Cole for Buckingham North is a Motorsport Commentator for Eurosport TV and a serving magistrate. He was previously Chairman of Thornborough Parish Council before moving on to Page Hill. There are also currently two vacancies, one in Buckingham South and one in Highlands & Watchcroft. These will be filled by co-option. The decision will be made on the 8th June.

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DOGS WELCOME, BUT...

With the boom in housing growth, an increase in dog ownership has also been noticeable and whilst we love owners who are responsible and considerate of others, there is a minority of owners who are not. Therefore we have put together this handy guide;

- when your dog poos pick it up; if a child falls or treads in the mess they can get seriously ill. A single gram can contain up to 3 million coliform bacteria, which causes cramps, diarrhoea, intestinal illness, kidney disorders and blindness. That's aside from the nasty smell following them around all day.
- if the dog bins are full, look for another bin, any other bin! Dog poo goes into landfill, so you can even take it home and put it with your household rubbish.
- dogs off the lead can cause anxiety to other people for a number of reasons; someone may have had a negative dog encounter. A child may be terrified by a dog bounding up to them. Owners of less friendly dogs may become stressed, which their dogs will pick up on, making things worse.

- if your dog is left alone for long periods, check with your neighbours that it isn't barking too much, as this can be as annoying as living next to a house with a drum kit in every room!
- Unless otherwise stated by a Buckingham Town Council sign, keep all dogs on a lead.

Although we don't have a regular Dog Warden, we are working on an initiative called 'Park Friends'. We hope to enlist people who are already in the parks (either walking dogs, exercising or taking children to the playgrounds) to be an extra set of eyes for us. Our Park Friends will be given free training – the role will be non-confrontational so you don't need to be built like a bouncer in a nightclub.
