WHAT WE ARE DOING DURING COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has made things difficult for everyone. Isolation has been hard to adapt to, but the Council has been doing everything it can to change its services and staffing arrangements to enable as many people as possible to stay home to save lives.

How the Council has been supporting the town during the pandemic:

- Created alternative online community events, where public events have had to be cancelled, including celebrating VE Day.
- Implemented government advice and ensured the cemetery remains open and can support burials safely.
- Helped doctors' surgeries by initially helping with delivery of medications.
- Released a member of staff to support the food banks.
- Changed the way our green spaces teams work to keep staff safe in parks, and enacted government guidance about green spaces use while keeping the parks as accessible as possible for daily exercise.
- Worked with grant recipients to ensure funds can be spent in the best way in the light of the crisis.
- Maintained web pages by giving up to date information about Council services and support for Buckingham businesses.

Town Council:

The office has been closed to visitors since we entered lockdown. However, staff are still working from home wherever possible. All emails, post and phone calls have been answered in the normal way.

Tourist Information Centre:

The Tourist Information Centre in the Old Gaol is closed until further notice. Centre staff are still answering calls Monday to Friday 10am - 4pm. They are happy to answer enquiries about local transport, walks and shops or to direct calls to help and assistance where needed. Call: 01280 823020

Shopmobility:

The Shopmobility service is closed until further notice. The phone line will be answered on Tuesday and Saturdays between 10am – 4pm. Call: 07738 314027.

Markets:

Shopping on the market is still available for essential supplies. Markets are open from 8am-4pm on Tuesdays and Saturdays.

Grounds Maintenance:

The Green Spaces team are still working hard to maintain Bourton and Chandos parks along with the other green spaces around Buckingham including the cemetery. Please note that all play areas have been closed in order to meet the government's guidelines.

Lace Hill Community Centre:

Lace Hill Sports and Community Centre is closed. The Centre will be available to hire as soon as government regulations and advice allow.

Events:

Many of our events have been cancelled due to the government's advice because of coronavirus. Our Events Coordinator is looking at whether it is possible to rearrange some of the events that have sadly been cancelled, as well as forward planning for later in the year. We will resume our full events programme as soon possible, but we are also making plans to run events differently and more safely where we can in the meantime.

We worked with the Old Gaol and Antire Technical Productions to light up the Old Gaol in blue for the NHS on 30th April 2020.

HELPING TO RE-OPEN BUCKINGHAM

Buckingham Town Council is asking all businesses in the town to help think about what can be done to help businesses reopen and support the high street.

The Council developed an 'After Lockdown' guidance pack for shops and services to help them trade safely in the coming months and explain the plans to re-open public spaces in the town centre.

Seeking Ideas

Buckingham's Economic Development Working Group met on 26th May to discuss ideas to help the town reopen as restrictions are lifted. Including: extending free parking, providing outdoor tables for those buying take away goods and providing advice and guidance.

Online Shopping Platform

We understand that in the short to medium term, town centre footfall will be reduced, and shops will be unable to serve as many customers as usual at one time.

It was decided to explore the option of an online shopping platform and home delivery service for businesses in Buckingham, by working with Sally Williams from Retail Revival Ltd, who set up the Risborough Basket with Princes Risborough Town Council.

Sally is keen to hear about your business needs and issues as you adapt to new trading conditions and her findings and recommendations will inform our immediate plans for business support.

PAST EVENTS

This year's events started with the annual **Pancake Races** on Saturday 22nd February. The pancake races took place on the green outside St Peter and St Paul Church. The event was opened by the Town Mayor and Town Crier. The Bard of Buckingham, Dean Jones was also in attendance and read out the poem he had written for the event.

The event consisted of 4 races for different age categories (5 and under, 6-11 year olds, 12-16 year olds and adults) and there was also a team relay race. This year's winners were: Logan Mays (5 years and under); Alexander



Phillips (6-11 years); Dean Jones (adult class); Dean Jones's team (team relay).



Over 900 people visited the 8th annual **Buckingham Food Fair** which was held on Saturday 29th February in the Community Centre. Due to unforeseen circumstances and the prediction of high winds with gusts up to 60mph we did not have any outdoor traders.

This year there were 22 traders in the main hall. Stalls ranged from award winning Indian Chutneys, handmade chocolates, craft beers, gins, pies, bread,

preserves, eggs, tea blends, seasonings, olives, nuts, baklava, fudge, information on recycling, Fairtrade products, cakes and organic cotton beeswax food wraps and bags. Cookery Doodle Doo organised children's cookery and baking classes and came along to do a pop up session offering children the chance to assemble a flowerpot cheesecake. Visitors could also receive refreshments from the Buckingham WI.

BUCKINGHAM CANAL SOCIETY REPORT

When we last visited our site in Bourton Meadow the marsh marigolds were all in bloom which made a wonderful display.

The wildlife had returned as soon as the canal bed filled with water. There were swans, ducks and ducklings last year and plenty of toads in residence this year along with reported sightings of three otters in and around the canal also.

Our volunteers had cut back hedges and strimmed the canal side next to the towpath but had left some parts where the Phragmites reeds are growing in place. This was because a Reed Warbler had nested in the reeds and we didn't want to disturb it.

What kept the site looking good was not only our very own volunteers last year who helped make it look presentable but also all the extra support we had received from external companies that carried out some 'community and team building' days with us. This year, we could potentially have three new outside companies to volunteer with us, one of them being Volkswagen.

We also visited our other site at Hyde Lane Nature Reserve which is on part of the Ouse Valley way. This had been where we had installed oak planking along the edge of the canal bank. We had given the canal bank a hard strim at the end of last year and this had produced a mass of wild flowers including banks of primroses and blossom. The saplings, all native species that had planted themselves in all the hedges, were all doing well, and the solar panels that had been installed before my visit had also been working fine.

Unfortunately, a tree had fallen across the towpath near the seating area and there were plans to remove it but the access to the site which is via a farm gate was shut so the tree had to be left.

We are of course looking forward to getting back on both sites to continue the work for the benefit of both wildlife and people walking the Ouse Valley way.

COUNCILLOR CO-OPTION VACANCY

Vacancy for a New Town Councillor

There is currently a vacancy for a new Buckingham Town Councillor following the sad death of Derrick Isham earlier this year. This will now be filled by the Council co-opting a new member as it is not possible to hold a by-election.

No previous experience is required but councillors need to take a keen interest in the local community and have a genuine desire to make a difference. As well as full council meetings, the new councillor will be offered the option to join the following committees; Resources, Environment, Town Centre and Events and Planning. Council meetings take place on Monday nights and start at 7pm. During the Covid-19 crisis all meetings are being held via Zoom.

To be eligible you must either live or work within Buckingham or live no more than three miles outside.

If you wish to be considered for the vacancy, then please visit the Buckingham Town Council website and download and complete the co-option questionnaire (or call 01280 816426 to request a hard copy). Then send it with a short (single side of A4) statement on why you wish to be co-opted as a Town Councillor to committeeclerk@buckingham-tc.gov.uk. Applications open on Monday 8th June and close on Monday 29th June. The new councillor will be chosen during the 13th July meeting of the full council.

Buckingham Town Council currently manage a budget of around one million pounds which is spent on services such as parks, events and economic development. The council is also consulted on planning applications and is currently developing a new neighbourhood plan.

As a councillor you will direct how that budget is spent and have a real influence on the future development of the town.

WHAT THE TOWN COUNCIL

2019/20 – Resources Committee

Broadly speaking, the Town Council's Resources committee oversees the Council's budgets, staffing, policies and communications.

It ensures that overall expenditure remains in line with budgets set out at the beginning of the financial year, including initially reviewing grants to external organisations. It also reviews staffing and statutory polices affecting employees, health and safety, data protection etc. The Communications Strategy Group also comes under its remit.

The Committee's meeting Minutes are available on the Town Council website, but here are some highlights from last year:

- (i) we considered funding options for the new cemetery, upgrading the Community Centre, and modernisation of the Council Chamber;
- (ii) we agreed to appoint an administrative apprentice and considered additional Mayoral support, various Councillor training options, and the implications of the deferred elections;
- (iii) we reviewed the Council's insurance, Standing Orders, Child Safeguarding and Photography Policy, Health and Safety Policy, Precept and Business Plan, Staff Handbook, Climate Emergency Plan, and the Compliments, Complaints and FOI: Freedom of Information requests received;
- (iv) we publicised the Council's application for Buckingham Hospital to be made an Asset of Community Value; and
- (v) we re-affirmed the Council's intention to move further towards less paperdependency whilst also simplifying paperwork that was issued.

The Town Centre and Events Committee

is responsible for the annual and one off events which promote the town, maintain tradition, give value for money and promote a community feeling of togetherness.

We usually start the year off with our annual pancake races and then in May we keep tradition by having maypole and country dancing. It is important for the Council to facilitate these traditional events which are so well supported by local children and their schools.

All our events that happen during the year always prove popular with the residents of Buckingham and they are reviewed regularly to ensure that we use the residents' money effectively, wisely and get the best value for money.

In 2019 we appointed our first Bard of Buckingham and it was agreed that he was to present some of his original pieces at a range of our events; these have clearly been enjoyed by all who attend.

The committee has also supported the photographic competition that resulted in the launch of the Buckingham Calendar and we are glad to report that it did well and it will be repeated this year for 2020.

We celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Moon Landing with an event that we held in Bourton Park which had a great turn out of people.

2019/2020 – Environment Committee Report



The Environment

Committee's responsibilities include the green spaces which are owned by the Town Council. These include Bourton Park, Chandos Park, Lace Hill Sports pitches, the Railway Walk and the Cemetery. We also own the Lace Hill Community Centre, public toilets in Cornwall's Meadow and several play areas. Roundabout sponsorship in the Town is another responsibility of this Committee. The Estates Manager and his team maintain and enhance these key parts of Buckingham's environment.

We've agreed for Buckingham United to maintain our pitches at Lace Hill, and have allowed them to have storage space and removable barriers and shelters to enhance their facilities.

The Town has declared a Climate Emergency and the Environment committee is a main player in progressing actions on behalf of the Council. We've purchased an electric van for use in the parks, we are installing a water bottle refill station in Chandos Park and we are planting more trees in our parks.

Volunteers are important in helping us to protect and enhance our natural environment.

We work with volunteers through our Buckingham Community Wildlife Project in order to benefit the wildlife in our area and we work with representatives from the Railway Walk Conservation group, the Canal Society and the Buckingham Society.

2019/2020 – Planning Committee Report

The Planning Committee received 137 planning applications from 2019 and approximately 30% of these were opposed for various reasons; many for new housing in inappropriate numbers or places. These include 420 houses off Osier Way, 32 flats above and behind M&Co, 17 flats behind the CAB,11 houses around the old Station House on Tingewick Road, 9 houses between Tesco and Wipac, 4 houses in Overn Crescent garage court, 4 houses in Wharf Yard, a new block of 10 flats in Verney Close behind the old NatWest building and conversion of the Oddfellows Hall into 9 flats.

We have also had discussions with VAHT about demolishing the garages behind Pightle Crescent and for there to be modular houses built there instead. We are also working to get the cycleway along the Railway/Scenic Walks into operation to give the new residents of St. Rumbold's Fields a safe route to schools and the industrial parks.

The big development on Tingewick Road is in progress and the plans for bringing the Grand Junction back into use were welcomed. The plans for a McDonalds on the Tesco site were approved after some negotiation, and the 2015 application for a new cemetery site was finally approved in January 2020.

We look forward to working with the new Buckinghamshire Council in planning matters to achieve the best results for Buckingham.
