A MESSAGE FROM YOUR MAYOR



I am sure that we have all been horrified by the unfolding events in Ukraine. The war there started less than a month after our first Holocaust Memorial Day commemoration in Buckingham. At that time, I would not have even considered another war in Europe to be possible. How sad and shocking this is. Buckingham is in the process of working out how to support refugees when they arrive here. I am sure that our community will respond generously, whether by providing accommodation, or offering support in other ways.

Have you spotted the new signs on the roads into Buckingham yet? Or the finger-post signs outside the Council Chamber? These now name both our Twin Towns: Mouvaux in France, and Neukirchen-Vluyn in Germany. It was a great pleasure for me to welcome groups from those towns for a vibrant weekend in March. We were at last able to celebrate not only the English signing of our Twinning agreement with Neukirchen-Vluyn, but also 20 years of Twinning with Mouvaux. The market was alive with the sights and sounds of an Oompah Band, Morris Dancers, and also a Mime Artist. These friendships seem to me to be increasingly important in our troubled world. It was an honour for me to meet with the Mayors of our two Twin Towns, as well as to have the opportunity to come together in friendship and solidarity with our European friends.

This year we are also celebrating Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. I have already been involved in planting trees at The University of Buckingham and in Heartlands for The Queen's Green Canopy. We have a number of different events planned for Buckingham. Details of these can be found on page seven. I hope to see many of you there. This is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on and give thanks for Queen Elizabeth II's 70-year reign.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING REPORT & EARTH HOUR

On the 24th March people from the community of Buckingham attended a public meeting on the climate emergency, alongside local representatives and MP Greg Smith. People gathered to express their views on climate change and to share ideas and suggestions on how to respond as a whole community.

The Mayor of Buckingham, Councillor Margaret Gateley, opened the meeting, giving an update on Buckingham Town Council which has declared a Climate Emergency. The Town Council is constantly reviewing its own Action Plan to drive the organisation towards carbon neutrality by 2030.

The meeting had six tables, each on a different topic, with people moving around the room to discuss different aspects of the action plan.

There were stalls from Planet Refill, Bucks Electric Vehicles, Buckingham & Villages Community Board, Buckingham Town Council, Buckingham Canal Society and Buckinghamshire Recycles. A sixth table was based around Earth Hour which is an important environmental movement



organised by the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF). The event is to encourage individuals, communities, and businesses to turn off non-essential electric lights for one hour as a symbol of commitment to the planet.

Displayed at the meeting were 'rubbish mosaics', artwork created by local secondary school students. The artwork has been created from materials that would normally be thrown away but instead has been recycled for the use of public art. This project is not only helping to highlight the benefits of recycling but also the importance of youth engagement in this important subject. The artwork will continue to be displayed until the summer holidays in the Tourist Information Centre for everyone to come and see.

At the end of the session some attendees joined a Community Climate Action Group to investigate ways of building a strong and resilient community to tackle the threat of the climate crisis in Buckingham. GRANT RECIPIENTS

Four year grants

Buckingham's new long term grants system begins this year, with long term, four year grants offered to more groups than ever before. The changes that have been made give local groups, that residents rely on, more security about their funding, helping them plan for their future, and creating a win win situation for everyone.

Four year 2022 – 2026 grants were awarded to the following groups:

Citizens Advice Bucks – Help maintain the Buckingham Citizens Advice Office and home visiting service as an accessible space for anyone in need of advice or emergency referrals in the Buckingham area. – **£5,750**

Buckingham Youth Clubs – Support the running of three youth clubs for secondary school age young people in Buckingham, all the youth clubs are supported by trained staff and give young people opportunities to try new things and explore opportunities. – **£5,200**

Buckingham Old Gaol Trust – To carry forward plans to improve the long term security of the Old Gaol Museum, through partner projects, exhibitions, maintenance and management of the museum as an entity and building. – **£5,000**



Buckingham Summer Festival – Organise and host the annual Festival Gala Concert as part of Buckingham Summer Festival. – **£2,000**

Chandos Park Tennis Club – Replace the 10 floodlights at the Tennis Club with environmentally friendly LED lamp alternatives – **£1,500**



Chandos Park Bowls Club – Maintain the Chandos Park Bowls Club Green to club standard. – **£1,000**

Project Street Life – Funding subsidises the place of a young person, resident in Buckingham, in financial need to attend the Project Street Life residential weekend. – **£500**

Buckingham Fairtrade Town Steering Group – Maintain Buckingham's status as a Fairtrade Town by holding promotional events and engaging with community groups and schools. – **£373**

The grant amount is paid to our four-year grant holders once a year, with a 3.5% uplift annually.

One year grants

As well as long term grants, Buckingham also offers one year funding for groups planning new projects. A wide range of applications were received, with projects varying from accessible sport to renewable energy and mentoring for young people at risk of offending.

One year grants were awarded to the following groups:

Transitions UK – Aspire Partnership: Buckingham hub, mentoring for young people at risk – **£2,000**

Buckingham Town Cricket Club – roof mounted solar panels for the club house – **£1,500**

Swan Community Hub – free family summer fun sessions for younger children – **£1,380**

Buckingham United Football Club – new club training equipment – **£1,000**

West End Bowls Club – flood defences for the club house – **£1,000**

Lace Hill Residents' Association – community spirit projects, holiday events and more – **£968**

Buckingham & District Angling Association – building an accessible for all fishing platform – **£623**



St Peter & St Paul's Church – Platinum Beacon, to be lit as part of the Jubilee celebrations – **£324**

Twinning in the Market took place on Saturday 19th March 2022 to celebrate Buckingham's relationship with Mouvaux in France and Neukirchen-Vluyn in Germany. Bavarian Strollers, Brackley Morris Men and Mime Artists Inc. performed outside The Old Gaol and visitors enjoyed the sunshine whilst lounging in our deckchair! Part-funding for this event was provided by the Government's 'Welcome Back Fund' from Buckinghamshire Council.



Lace Hill's **Easter Bazaar** took place on Sunday 10th April 2022 and displayed lots of wonderful handmade arts and crafts as well as bespoke gifts. There were also free games and activities for children to enjoy.

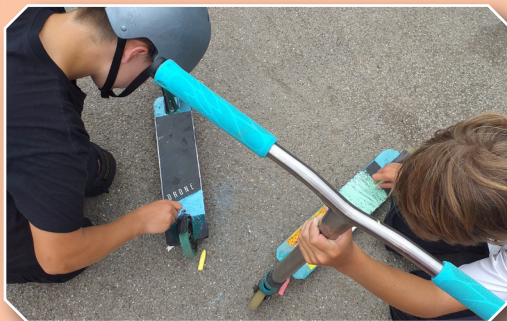

SWAN SCULPTURE TRAIL

The Buckingham Otter Trail was a highlight for Buckingham last summer – the otters are a starring feature in so many summer photos and happy memories for residents as well as those who came from further afield and discovered Buckingham while completing the trail. The art on each otter was a combination of the work of community groups and schools and professional artists – who all did a sterling job. This year we have exciting plans to build on the fantastic profile the project created and bring you a new temporary public art sculpture trail for 2022!

This year's sculptures will be bespoke swans, made from recycled, reformed plastic that weathers much the same as fibreglass but is much better for the environment. In this way, material that was headed for landfill is made into art.

FLOOD REPORT



The Flood Report is available on Buckinghamshire Council's website, or by following this QR code.



December 2020 saw significant flooding in Buckingham. A formal flood investigation was undertaken by Buckinghamshire Council, which is the Lead Local Flood Authority (LLFA) for the area.

The flood caused internal flooding to 72 properties, and the flood report concludes that it was caused by consistently high rainfall over a number of months, followed by a month's worth of rain in the short period up to the 23rd December. The Environment Agency's flood warning was not issued until after many properties had already been flooded. This limited the response individual residents and the community could offer. Changes have since been made to the Environment Agency's flood warning system.



During the flood Buckingham Town Council implemented its flood response plan and was able to help residents alongside volunteers

and local businesses who all stepped in to do what they could. After the flooding, the Council reviewed its plan to improve our ability to support residents at risk of flooding. If you would like to be involved and join us as a Community Flood Warden please email office@buckingham-tc.gov.uk.

Debris/fallen trees in the river

Many residents are rightly concerned about fallen trees or debris in the river. While smaller branches aren't of significant concern, large items big enough to trap other debris floating down the river can create an obstruction and increase flood risk to the surrounding area.

When this happens the landowner responsible for the tree is required to clear the debris. This must be done from the side of the bank where the tree has fallen and often involves bringing in specialist contractors. However, it's extremely important that these obstructions are removed as quickly as possible.

Where you see an obstruction in the river, it can be reported to the Environment Agency by calling 0800 80 70 60. The Town Council reports fallen trees and debris in this way and will provide information to Buckinghamshire Council and the Environment Agency to support enforcement where it can.

WHAT THE TOWN COUNCIL ACHIEVED 2021/2022

Environment Committee

The last year has been a productive one for the Environment Committee and the council's Green Spaces team. I am very grateful for all the hard work by our staff in keeping our parks well maintained and providing uninterrupted service throughout the pandemic.

The new Garden of Rest has been completed at the Brackley Road Cemetery, and work is commencing with designs for the new Tingewick Road Cemetery. The wildflower meadow in Bourton Park has proved very popular.

We launched the community gardening scheme this spring, and welcome residents to come forward to help improve some of our forgotten corners of green space.

We made good progress with tree planting around the town, and the committee and volunteers took part in a big planting event in the Heartlands Park in conjunction with Buckinghamshire Council, with over 250 trees planted.

The new 55 photovoltaic solar panels were installed on the Lace Hill Centre and will contribute to reducing our electricity bills, and carbon emissions of this popular community building.



Buckingham's new Holocaust Memorial Stone was placed in Bourton Park for the ceremony in January, with the inaugural reflection led by the Mayor. This event was well attended.

The Town Council's Resources Committee is responsible for budgets, staffing, policies and communications. The following is just a fraction of the work this committee has done in the past 8 months:

- 1 Agreed a Sustainable Purchasing and Procurement Policy, buying/hiring locally, Fairtrade, recycled, plastic free, repairable and sustainable wherever possible.
- 2 Agreed to appoint a design consultancy company for our new cemetery.
- 3 Updated IT equipment in the Chamber so members of the public can attend on Zoom if they can't attend in person, plus our meetings are available on YouTube.
- 4 Conducted an Eco Audit for all our Council owned buildings.
- 5 Changed IT and mobile providers after a robust tendering process.
- 6 Regularly reviewed our Climate Emergency Action Plan, a page on our website gives information and advice.
- 7 Revised our Equality and Diversity Policy, reviewing it yearly to keep up with new Laws and good practice guidelines.

Planning Committee

The past year has been challenging for the Committee, during the gradual transition from district councils to the Buckinghamshire Council unitary authority. Promised devolution of some planning powers to town and parish councils failed or was slow to materialise, against a background of forever-changing government planning policies and decisions, and the new Vale of Aylesbury Plan (VALP).

Foremost among these for us was the cancellation of both the East-West Expressway and the Oxford-Cambridge Arc, which would have called for one million new homes between the two university cities, 40,000 of them in North Bucks. That threat has now receded, but the VALP is forcing more housing on Buckingham, without adequate health contributions, and not where we want it, contrary to our Buckingham Neighbourhood Plan (BNP).

During the past 12 months we have dealt with hundreds of applications and enforcement cases as a statutory planning consultant, but we have recently noted a marked improvement in our relationship with the Local Planning Authority, as staff levels rise, and officers take more note of our comments and of the BNP.

I would like to acknowledge the valuable role which the Buckingham Society continues to play in planning matters.
