

The Changing Face of Buckingham...Part 1

You may have noticed in the newspapers how the Government is planning big changes to planning law, and wondered how this will affect things nearer to home. The simple answer is that we shall have a greater say in future developments taking place in our town – but of course, it isn't quite as simple as that. Your Town Council is currently working on a **Neighbourhood Plan for Buckingham** which, along with similar plans from other towns and the larger villages, will feed into the Vale of Aylesbury Plan. Neighbourhood Plans are not just wish–lists – they have to meet certain legal requirements, including full justification for the preferences expressed.

One of the legal necessities is to seek opinions from those affected by the Neighbourhood Plan – which is why we have circulated questionnaires around the town, in order to get as many views as possible. If you have yet to complete a questionnaire, please pick one up at the library, or fill one in via our website www.buckingham-tc.gov.uk

The questionnaire responses will be fed into the first stage of the process,



called a **Sustainability Appraisal**, which will then be made available for you to comment

> on. We shall then move on to testing some of the ideas you come up with.

All this is time-consuming and costly, but Buckingham Town Council is one of 126 areas in the country designated "frontrunners" for Neighbourhood Planning, and so has received a grant of £20,000 to help deliver the goods.

We'll report further in future editions of Buckingham Town Matters.

ROAD GRITTING & SNOW CLEARANCE

Advance weather forecasts predict heavy snow in December – again. Whereas we can hope that the meteorologists have got it wrong, **Transport for Buckinghamshire** (part of Bucks County Council) are working on their snow clearance schedules. Unfortunately, their resources will not permit them to clear all roads, so some parts of Buckingham will present a challenge to pedestrians and motorists alike.

At present, it is highly unlikely that all town centre bus and school routes will be gritted. Side roads certainly won't be, and we hope that the increase in the numbers of grit bins will allow residents to make their immediate localities a little safer – but remember that these are for use on the road and footway, not for clearing your drive! Some local farmers in the county have been contracted to help with the more rural areas, and our maintenance team will be out and about in the town centre again, as they did last year.

In previous years, shop keepers and residents have been wary of clearing pavements etc. outside their properties in case they get sued by someone slipping over. Bucks County Council advise that it is OK to sweep snow away, and to put down salt to prevent ice forming, but urge you not to try and melt ice with hot water – it just re–freezes. If you are inclined to clear the path outside your property, perhaps you could also consider doing a neighbour's path if they are elderly or otherwise unable to clear it themselves.

And while talking about helping others, do you own a 4x4 vehicle? If so, would you be prepared to help Home Carers do their essential work when road conditions prevent them from using their own cars? So a special thanks to all those involved – and if any other traders want to join in and take part next year, they are more than welcome!


KEEPING YOUR TOWN CLEAN & TIDY

The next scheduled mechanical clean for Buckingham is during week commencing 26th December. Please note that if there are cars parked on the roads then the mechanical cleaner will not be able to do a thorough job.

Despite the huge amount of rubbish thoughtlessly left in the town centre on Friday and Saturday nights, our street cleaners do a magnificent job in removing it early in the morning.

This was most noticeable following the two weekends that the Charter Fair was in town, and drew congratulatory remarks from (amongst others) our local police officers.

Handy Hints to Keep You Safe from Crime

Keeping your home safe

A dark house at this time of the year is a sure sign that there's no one at home. You can fool a burglar by having a light on a timer switch that comes on when it gets dark. They are a cheap and easy solution to make your home looked lived–in, especially if you are a commuter who returns home late or in the evening, or if you go away for the holidays.

In the event your property is stolen, property marking your belongings with a UV pen is an effective way for the police to identify your possessions, should they later be recovered. If your windows and doors are locked sufficiently and belongings such as car keys and mobile phones are hidden from view, it is unlikely that you will be a victim of burglary.

Keeping yourself safe

Thieves love Christmas. The crowded shops are a magnet for pick–pockets. You can protect your purse by attaching a cat bell to it – the noise will alert you if anyone tries to swipe it from your bag or pocket.

Another way to keep your handbag safe is to have the zip facing frontwards so you can see it, which makes it less likely a theft will take place. If it has a shoulder strap, wear it diagonally so that it cannot easily be snatched.

When you do the big Christmas shop, don't leave shopping bags on display in your car. Lock them in the boot, out of sight, or use the parcel pick–up service that many larger stores now offer.

We want everyone to have a good time at Christmas, especially at all the parties. Taxis can be in short supply at peak times in the holidays – make sure you book yours ahead of time, so you know you can get home safely. If you have to walk home, don't walk alone and let someone know where you are.

Finally, have a safe and happy Christmas and New Year!

BUCKINGHAM JUDGED BEST AGAIN!! Best Kept Town 2011 – the Michaelis Cup

(communities with populations over 3000)

Buckingham has won the Best Kept Town for the fourth time. After winning it in 2002, 2005 and 2008, the Town Council is pleased to announce that the Michaelis Cup is again in pride of place in the Council Chamber.

In June the judges visited the Town and gave marks out of 100 for Places of Worship, Parks, verges and flower beds, Memorials etc. Additional marks are awarded for general appearance and evidence of community effort, including such things as noticeboards being up–to–date. Buckingham scored 9/10 on this category, giving an overall total of 88/100.

On 10th September 2011, Buckingham played host to VIPs from BALC (Bucks. Association of Local Councils) who organise the Competition. **The Lord–Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire, Sir Henry Aubrey–Fletcher,** presented the **Town's Deputy**



Mayor, Clir. Ms. Ruth Newell, with the award and admired the beautiful backdrop of the Buckingham Old Gaol.

The Judges felt that the overall standards in the town were very high with improvements made in some categories. This is down to hard work by the Town Council's Green Spaces and Events team.

Next year the town will be aiming to keep the standard high and maybe secure the Tindal Cup, which is the cup winners' cup for winners of the previous year's competition.

Buckingham Town Youth Council – Giving Youth a Voice

The Youth Council was formed on the 1st July 2011 consisting of 5 students from the Royal Latin School, 2 students from The Buckingham School and 1 student from Kingsbrook. The young people are also representing the Air & Army Cadets, the Youth Centre and the Scouts, and are supported by **Councillor Lisa O'Donoghue** and the **Deputy Town Clerk Mrs Anita Simonds.**

The Youth Councillors have moved quickly in recognising some issues within our town and beyond – these include the lack of:

- Transport to nearby villages
- A cinema
- A shelter or place to sit in Bourton Park for older teens
- An outdoors 'teenage' music event (like BandJam)
- An "Under 18's event" in a nightclub environment (like Oceana in MK, who have monthly events but can exclude those without the means to get home after 10pm due to transport issues)
- Any form of ID for anyone under 16 years of age
- The Youth Councillors having any formal identification, and
- A means of young people contacting the Youth Council.



Moving on some of these issues, Vice Chair Councillor Hannah Russell is in the process of writing to the transport and cinema companies, whilst their Clerk is finding out about the possibility of a further shelter in Bourton Park. Councillor Lisa O'Donoghue is designing an ID badge for the Youth Councillors to wear and advice was given on possible funding sources if the Youth Council wish to look into a town-wide under 18's ID scheme. An email address was also created for the Youth Council -BuckinghamTownYouthCouncil@gmail.com and Councillor Adam Bradbury will be setting up a Facebook page shortly.

Thanks to the diligent work of the Youth Council, especially the Chair, **Councillor Jordan Mayer**, Buckingham's first "Under 18's night" was held on Tuesday 25th October from 7pm to 11pm at 13 High Street. They were helped by **Amanda Brubaker**, the Town Council Events Assistant; Councillor Lisa O'Donoghue; and **Kate Richardson** from the Youth Centre. The manager of 13 High Street was incredibly supportive and is willing to put on more "under 18's" events which, given the success of the pilot event, is great to hear as this could become a regular place for our young people to go!

YOUTH CENTRE

When Buckingham County Council withdrew all youth funding in Buckingham, Buckingham Town Council decided that such a valuable resource should not be lost. As a consequence, it now funds youth works.

In February Buckingham Town Council agreed to set aside £15,000 to help fund youth workers at Buckingham Youth Centre. The Centre was facing an uncertain time, with Buckinghamshire County Council making large cuts to their Youth Services budget. Members of the Youth Centre Management Committee and a number of young people approached the Town Council and asked it for help. Since then, the Youth Centre Management Committee has been hard at work preparing for the termination of the funding from BCC.



A new not-for-profit company has been formed to run the Tuesday and Thursday evening youth clubs and the Music club on Friday nights. Town Council funding has provided money to employ a Youth Leader and Assistant Youth Leaders, as well as providing professional support to the Music club – thereby saving five jobs and the service in Buckingham.

The funding for this year allows the Youth Club Management Committee to seek longer-term funding to ensure that our Youth Clubs can continue into the future.
