Message from Mayor Ruth

Hello...

I've had a very difficult personal time in the last month with the death of my father, the Rev'd Aubrey Newell, on 22nd September.

Over a number of years, he cared wonderfully for my mother who has been in hospital for many months and still remains very poorly. My parents lived and worked in the area for 33 years before moving back to Wales: Dad as Vicar and Rural Dean and Mum as Chemistry Teacher at the Royal Latin School. I was very close to my parents and they have been a wonderful influence on me and always the source of sensible advice.

I've just returned from the 10th anniversary of our twinning with Mouvaux in France. The Twinning Association organised a coach to take us from Buckingham on Friday 13th October. We travelled by ferry from Dover to Calais, and our journey through France was only just over an hour. We returned on Sunday 15th October. Mouvaux is close to Lille and the Belgian border and my husband and I recognised the names of towns where our grandfathers fought in the World Wars. I am very grateful to all those who work so hard to make twinning work both in Buckingham and Mouvaux, and the host families do a wonderful job. We stayed with a lovely family with 2 teenage daughters, and our daughter Lara came with us. Cécile

Dussart. the mother of the family was a brilliant English speaker and cook, I am grateful to the other young people who came with us - Rory Butcher of the Youth Council, Sophie Dinnie who sang brilliantly, and Caitlin McErlean who played the clarinet wonderfully. We had a minute's silence to remember Patrick Balay, Mayor of Mouvaux 10 years ago when the twinning started, and Ben Ogden who had spent a month in Mouvaux a few years ago, both of whom died recently; Ben tragically in the air crash in Nepal.

Apologies regarding Buckingham in Bloom in the last newsletter - I had the wrong number in Grenville Road for one of the commended gardens, it should have been Mrs Chart of 36 Grenville Road, I remember it well - a beautiful pastel colour scheme of white, blue, pink and purple.

It was lovely to see round Prebend House, recently restored by the University of Buckingham, and together with the wonderful upgrading of the Radcliffe Centre. I am very grateful to the University for their excellent quality of work in looking after our beautiful buildings in Buckingham.

POLICE ALERTS

Keeping Buckingham Safe: how you can help

At the Town Council we aim to do our bit for crime reduction and assist in keeping Buckingham a peaceful and safe community. We have put articles in this newsletter to keep you informed of what we are doing. We also know that a safe community is maintained by everyone taking action.

While Buckingham is a safe place to live (relative to inner city areas), we can all do more to keep it safe. Here are four things you might like to consider doing:

- 1 If you see anything suspicious, the number to call now is 101. You will be put through to your nearest police call centre. (Unless of course it is an emergency such as witnessing a crime actually happening, in which case dial **999**).
- 2 There is a service called "Thames Valley Alert: Community Messaging" which is an email based project. If you go to www.thamesvallevalert.co.uk you can sign up to receive messages about crimes and other information for Buckingham. You can also use the site to provide information that you think would be helpful to the Police. You won't be sent hundreds of emails, don't worry! You will also get to know more about how much crime is happening in our area.

- 3 If you would like to get more information about how you can prevent crime, Thames Valley Police have a very helpful website: www.thamesvalley.police.uk/crprev.htm to quide you.
- 4 On-going issues of concern, such as late-night noise, anti-social behaviour, heavy goods vehicles using inappropriate roads etc, could also be reported to the local Neighbourhood **Action Group (NAG).** The NAG is supported by the local police Neighbourhood Team, and seeks solutions to these and similar problems via a multi-agency approach.

Crowds of people of all ages filled the Bull Ring in Buckingham Town Centre on Sunday 26th August for this year's annual BandJam event. The Town Centre was rocking, with music by local bands such as Rufus Stone, Spaced Out, Bass Elegance and headline band My Holiday Romance.

The annual event is organised by Sean Allen of BandJam, and is sponsored by Buckingham Town Council. Natco Foods provide the trailer that is transformed into a stage for the event.

RIVER RINSE

The first of this year's annual river rinses took place on Sunday 16th September from the green footbridge in Cornwall's Meadow car park and ended at the footbridge behind the Woolpack. Volunteers from **Stowe Sub Aqua Group** were on hand again to go into the river to pull out any debris. They were assisted this year by **Buckingham Firefighters.** Other volunteers were members of the public and Buckingham Town Councillors. The finds included a Bowls Club sign, a half pint bottle belonging to Brooks Dairy, (where Brooks Court is now, in Well Street) and a concrete roller. The second rinse took place on 7th October through Chandos Park. Finds there included old fencing, a traffic cone and an old chair.





HARVEST FAIR

A successful Harvest Fair was held in the Old Cattle Pens in Buckingham Town Centre on Sunday 30th September. The event was organised by Buckingham Town Council and **Transition Buckingham**, and was intended to promote community spirit and pride. Among the groups that took part were **Swan Market**, **Nimble Thimble**, **Transition Winslow**, and **Redfield**. People were able to see a bicycle powered smoothie maker and an apple press, and watch wool being carded and spun.

CHRISTMAS PARADE

15th December sees the 28th annual Christmas Parade in Buckingham Town Centre. The theme this year is 'Christmas Through The Commonwealth'. The parade starts at 10:45am from Chandos Road. There will be marching bands, floats, walkers, and much more. A road closure and diversions are in place whilst the parade moves through the Town and back.



COMMUNITY FAIR

After the Christmas parade has finished, come along to the **Community Centre** where you can buy your Christmas gifts, cards, calendars and much more. The event is organised by Buckingham Town Council and stalls are run by local fund raising groups, societies and charities. The event runs from **11:30am to 2pm**.



Co-option of the new Councillor

Buckingham North's new Councillor Christine Strain-Clark has been co-opted onto the Town Council to represent the people of Buckingham.

Mrs Strain-Clark moved to the town in 1980 with her family. She was a teacher for many years, before becoming a computer software developer.

She has previously been a Town Councillor from 1995 to 2007 and Mayor from 2001 to 2003. Councillor Strain-Clark was also a District Councillor from 1995 to 1999.

At the co-option meeting, Cllr. Strain-Clark stated her desire to support Buckingham's Neighbourhood Development Plan and underlined its importance as a key document for the future of the town. She also highlighted the new Localism Bill which gives the Town Council and the community more say in the future of Buckingham.

The Changing Face of Buckingham... part 5

Here is another chance for you to be involved in shaping the future of our Town.

This autumn the Neighbourhood Plan has begun its most significant stage. We've started to collect and produce a whole range of ideas for how the town should evolve over the next 20 years.

Some have been ideas that have been suggested for a long time (e.g. enhancing the river for leisure pursuits or allocating an industrial site that could be used by a motorsport team); some have been perhaps a little too ambitious (underground roads running beneath the parks and river) whilst other suggestions have been interesting new concepts that we might like to explore further (creating

new woodland or a western extension of the bypass).

Before we can establish detailed proposals though, there are still some key questions to address. First and foremost, Buckingham is required to accommodate 700 homes in the period up to 2031. This is in addition to the 1,000 that already have permission.

There is a lot of work being done to look at the suitability of various sites for these homes but we need to make sure their distribution is acceptable to you as well as the environment.

With that in mind, please consider the "big-choice" questions below and feel free to tick or fill in the boxes and pull out the page and drop it into the library.

Alternatively, look out for more Neighbourhood Planning events when you can get involved in a more hands-on way and look at the details.

Young people have their say



The 4th year of the Town Council's Local Democracy Event was kindly hosted by Haydon Chart at the Buckingham School, whose students along with some from the Royal Latin School asked questions on "Being and Feeling Safe in Buckingham".

Invitations for our panel went out to Inspector Emma Garside – Thames Valley Police, Town Clerk – Chris Wayman, Town & District Cllr. Robin Stuchbury, the Rt. Hon. John Bercow M.P, James Fowler – Detached Youth Worker, and Town Cllr. Lisa O'Donoghue was Chair.

A lot of questions were police orientated – Emma answered all queries and hopefully put students at ease. It was especially nice to hear that the number of incidents had fallen from last year despite housing growth.

Another concern was why our street lights were turned off, especially at key junctions. Cllr. Stuchbury and the Town Clerk explained who turned the lights off and why, but added that the Town Council has expressed its concern and the desire to have junction lights turned back on, especially going into Badgers and Linden Village. However our wishes haven't been granted as yet.

Mr. Bercow and other panel members couldn't stress enough the importance of young people voicing their opinions about such matters, either writing to the Town Council or the Advertiser, as it is nice to get a young person's perspective and opinion.

Students also seemed keen to learn about basic safety skills and asked if any schemes were available. Although none are in the pipeline, James Fowler asked the students to contact him and if enough interest was generated then he could deliver something either in school or a local community building – his email is MobileAndDetached@Buckscc.gov.uk

Massive thanks to the panel, to the students from both schools, to **Mike Porteous** from the Royal Latin and again to **Haydon Chart** and Buckingham School for hosting the event.
