REFERENDUM SUCCESS



After four years of research, numerous consultations with the town's residents and service providers, and the valuable support of the Buckingham Society, the Neighbourhood Plan Referendum took place on Thursday 17th September 2015. The results showed 91% of those who voted were in favour of the plan.

Coincidentally, the total number of votes was 2015, and 1840 people voted 'Yes' to the question "Do you want Aylesbury Vale District Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Buckingham to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?".

Town Councillors feel that it is a ringing endorsement of the community's desire to plan positively in the appropriate places, bring forward truly sustainable development for the town rather than developers making a 'quick buck' on sites which are less sustainable and against the community's wishes.

Buckingham Neighbourhood Development Plan

Planning applications are being discussed which are contrary to the Plan (and Town Councillors hope that District Council Members wake up and recognise the expressed wishes of Buckingham). While there are problems due to the lack of a Local Plan and a 5 year housing land supply with Aylesbury Vale District Council, the Town Council will be fighting unwanted development. The Neighbourhood Plan will be a great tool to ensure that the Town stays at its heart a Market Town.

The Town Council thanks all who answered consultations, attended meetings, spread the word and – best of all – voted for the Plan, which should give us a framework for development in the town area until 2031.



NEW STAFF

Buckingham Town Council is pleased to welcome a new member of staff to our team. Dean Jones, 37, started working for Buckingham Town Council as Deputy Town Clerk. Dean said 'I have been a part of the community for over 25 years and I'm looking forward to my new role and to making a positive impact on the town.'

He left the school on October 2nd which coincided with the grand opening of the Discovery Centre, a £5 million project to transform science and technology learning at the school.

BUCKINGHAMSHIRE BEST KEPT VILLAGE COMPETITION 2015

The Best Kept Village Competition has been running for 58 years and is a popular competition which is open to villages and small towns throughout Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes. Entries are usually made up of Parish and Town Councils but entries are also received from village hall committees or other active community groups.

Among the sponsors for The Best Kept Village Competition are Buckinghamshire County Council, Aylesbury Vale District Council, Chiltern District Council and Milton Keynes Council.

The village or town enters for the cup relevant to their population. As Buckingham is a town and has a population of over 3,000 we enter for the Michaelis Cup. Features that should be present are places of worship, village green, playing or recreational field with open access, community centre, or other suitable place for assembly.

Judging takes place in June and winners are notified in July.

This year the judge's comments stated that the Hunter Street graveyard and Brackley Road Cemetery were well maintained and that the circular walk which follows the river bank is well used and an attractive facility for residents and visitors alike. Buckingham was awarded a Certificate of Merit.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

My father, Butcher's apprentice Harold Cornwall bought his boss's business at 4 High Street, renting the premises and 'Cornwalls Meadow', where he raised lambs. He married Enid, the Congregational minister's daughter, in 1932. As Borough Councillor, Alderman and Mayor he served with tireless distinction. His Christian faith and resolute character inspired him to find ways forward. He was kind, hospitable, artistic and loyal. The Borough gained its first swimming pool and enjoyed its huge 500th Charter Anniversary celebration due to his hard work.

The meat rail remains on the ceiling of Prego's, beneath my boyhood bedroom.

I inherited my parents' faith and stubbornness, becoming a Borough Councillor and Mayor. There have been calamities but I'm very proud of Audrey, and our sons, Martin and Philip. As a Nonconformist lay preacher and activist I have spent decades



in ecumenical work and human rights campaigning. Four British citizens, including Maajid Nawaz, founder and Chairman of the anti-extremist think-tank Quilliam, were prisoners in Egypt I helped release, and I aided an improvement in English case law affecting women. My principles remain at 82 and I'm not finished yet, producing *The Free Church Friend* and helping arrange Amnesty's next Regional Conference on LGBTI (lesbian/ gay/bisexual/transexual/intersex) Rights.

BUCKINGHAM COMMUNITY WILDLIFE PROJECT STEERING GROUP

We are a group with representatives from the Town Council, Aylesbury Vale District Council's Green Spaces, The Buckingham Society, and from the 3 conservation groups in Buckingham. We work for wildlife conservation in the green spaces in our town, and here are details of recent work and plans.

Buckingham Railway Walk Conservation

Group have cleared out rubbish from the area behind the pond including remains of disused dens; dealt with fallen branches and trees at both ends of the walkway and last month we purchased some OSMO oil and applied it to the AVDC signs to help preserve the wood. Local people continue to collect the branches we leave stacked as logs to use on their fires and log burners, so fewer of the larger pieces of wood are now left on site. The teasel plants we planted alongside the path next to the school playing fields are growing well and will hopefully selfseed. Having received the tree labels we will choose which trees are suitable to be labelled and will attach them in the coming months. The group are currently cutting and clearing the glades to encourage wild flower growth. We are hoping that the Railway Walk pathway will be added to the BCC Definitive Map. Bourton Park and Heartlands – The Town Council has been working with the ponds; renovating and improving the penstock end with the Environment Agency and hoping to have a fish passage, so that fish can migrate up stream. In addition ponds will be desilted, river banks improved and the ponds renovated; we are working with the EA to do a feasibility study.

Buckingham Canal Society - The

contractors have relined the canal bed where it was leaking and now that the liner has been replaced everything seems fine. Volunteers have been back and have re-planted about 4,000 aquatic plants some of which are now in flower and there have been at least two sets of ducklings using the canal. Maids Moreton Avenue Conservation

Group – The group organises activities, looks after bird and bat boxes, and has established bug hotels. We hope that the footpath surface can be further improved to increase accessibility, and continue to seek the agreement of BCC and Buckingham Primary School to move the fence at the top of the Avenue to improve the very restricted public access, whilst allowing the school to continue with its woodland activities.

CHRISTMAS PARADE

If you are a local producer and would like a table, please contact Buckingham Town Council on 01280 816426. Over the last four issues we have offered you some of the special places and features of Buckingham that are perhaps not so well known. Here is our fifth and final piece:

• Did you know about the water pumps behind Oxfam, both were private ones used by the property owners and those neighbours they liked. The nearest "Town" public pump was in the market on the corner of what is now Barclays Bank. There was another up the Chewar and a third one was by what is now Lloyds Bank. The Town Council ran 5 public pumps altogether, so some folk had to walk a fair distance carrying their pails suspended from wooden yokes.

All Buckingham's water was gathered from public or private pumps until August 1893 when a waterworks was built off the Moreton Road. Then, many private householders, such as the two behind the Oxfam shop, objected to paying a "water rate" when they: a) weren't connected to the 'mains' and b) preferred to use the "fresh" water from their own pump.

All of Buckingham was connected to the water supply by 1908. Thereafter, one by one, the old pumps fell from use, usually because either their handles broke or the watertight valves needed mending and spares could not be bought.

** ** ** ** ** ** ** ** **ROAD GRITTING AND SNOW CLEARANCE

As usual at this time of year, Transport for Buckinghamshire (TfB – part of Bucks County Council) are working on their snow clearance schedules. Their resources will not permit them to clear all roads, so some parts of Buckingham will present a challenge to road users and pedestrians alike.

TfB advise that priority will be given to traffic flows, bus routes and school traffic, gradients and bends, collision records, adjacent key facilities ("blue light" services, schools etc.), and route accessibility. Past experience shows that town centre bus and school routes are unlikely to be gritted, and side roads certainly won't be. Residents are encouraged to use the increased number of salt bins to make their immediate localities a little safer, but remember that these are for use on the roads and footways only – not for clearing your drive! While you're about it, perhaps you could help a neighbour less able to do their own.

And it is perfectly OK for shop keepers and residents to clear pavements etc. outside their properties by sweeping snow away and putting salt down – but please DO NOT use hot water as it simply re-freezes.

A WORD FROM OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICE...

Advice from Insp. James Davies:

The nights are drawing in and it is normal for me to warn people of the increased risk of burglary. I would normally extol the virtues of timer switches. However, house burglary is down 24 per cent on last year in Buckingham and District and, while I am not resting on my laurels, it is noteworthy that this is the national trend. In fact we are seeing a greater amount of time spent dealing with safeguarding young people.

We now know more about the exploitation of children than ever and how it can touch the lives of children from very different backgrounds.

So while it is important to install timer switches in your home, it is more important that when your teen goes out in an evening you know exactly where they are and who they are with.

Ask yourself:

- Do they stay out overnight?
- Have they been missing from home?
- Do they skip school?
- Have they come home with money, clothes, jewellery or a mobile phone they can't account for?
- YOUR VIEWS COUNT

- Do they have an older boyfriend or girlfriend you are concerned about?
- Are you worried they are using drugs or alcohol?
- Have they lost contact with family and friends of their own age?
- Do they lack self-esteem?
- Are they secretive about where they go and who they see?
- Do they chat to people online they have never met?
- Are you worried about unsafe sexual behaviour?

If you are worried about a child or young person, you must do something – but it may not be easy to find out what is going on from them. If you have concerns then it is worth contacting the police or a charity, such as Barnardos.
