### **RAILWAY WALK CONSERVATION GROUP VOLUNTEERS**

Buckingham's Railway Walk Conservation Volunteers (RWCV) have received a grant of £3,000 from Heart of Bucks Community Foundation, a grant-giving registered charity, committed to making a difference to the lives of local people.

The RWCV are a wildlife conservation group in Buckingham, maintaining a wildlife corridor along the western end of Buckingham along an old train line, discontinued in the 1960s. The area has a series of ponds, created as nature-friendly wet spaces, alongside glades, an orchard and raised bridges. The conservation project encourages people to enjoy the benefits of being close to nature and promotes positive wellbeing. The funding from Heart of Bucks will allow more people within Buckingham to experience this positive impact either by volunteering with the project or reaping the benefits of the group's work and enjoying the improved outside spaces that the project develops.

The group has been running since 2006 and promotes and takes action to conserve local wildlife, by caring for the green space to preserve, increase and educate others about



the biodiversity of the site. The activities are coordinated by The Conservation Volunteers (TCV) and regular work parties take place on the first Saturday of the month. Previous activities have included: thinning trees, fence repairs, glade cutting and clearing, nest and bat boxes, and hedge maintenance.

A schedule of activities from now until July 2023 has been created for volunteers to undertake tasks such as coppicing and removing rubbish from the ponds, clearing fallen branches, making bird feeders, step repairs, mammal survey, checking conditions of signs and pruning various trees.

The Town Council teamed up with High Street Safari to provide residents and visitors with a free, family outdoor adventure called **The Mystery of the Secret Keys**. The aim of the event was to encourage more footfall to our High Street and give families a great day out. The story trail proved popular and got 386 families out walking around our town centre searching for clues to unlock characters in augmented reality. The keys were hosted by ten local businesses including: Cornwall Place Kitchen, Dandy Lions Boutique, Bea & Aud Lifestyle, M&Co, Golden Crust, Oxfam, Essentials, Howes the Florist, Finca El Monte and The Nimble Thimble.

This year's **Dog Show** was due to take place on Sunday 11th September 2022 in the Paddock in Bourton Park but due to

the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the event was cancelled.

The first **River Rinse** took place on Sunday 25th September 2022 cleaning the river from Tanlaw Mill to Fishers Field weir. A total of 21 volunteers from the Council and the public worked together to clear a skip's worth of debris from the river, including cans, bottles and an old tv. The second **River Rinse** took place on Sunday 9th October 2022 cleaning the river from the bypass bridge in Bourton Park to the cricket club. Lots of debris was cleared from this stretch of river including a children's scooter.

# Royal visits to Buckingham



The late Queen Elizabeth II visited Buckingham on two occasions, first in 1966 via train and then in 1996 to visit the University of Buckingham. On her first visit to Buckingham in 1966, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip met with the then Mayor of Buckingham, Alderman T. Lambourne at Buckingham Station. Images of the couple smilling in the train carriage were printed in the local paper. Those present when Queen Elizabeth II visited Buckingham remember these as splendid occasions, filled with pride.

There is a long link between Buckingham and the Royal Family. Buckingham has two Royal Charters, one from Mary Tudor in 1554, and one from Charles II in 1684. Charles II also gifted Buckingham its Mace in 1660, which is still used at ceremonial occasions today. Buckingham Palace is also named after Buckingham. Originally known as Buckingham House,

it was owned by the Duke of Buckingham and sold to George III in 1761.

Our newly acclaimed monarch, King Charles III has also visited Buckingham. He first visited the town in 2004 to meet students and staff and tour parts of the Hunter Street University Campus to pursue his interest in higher education. He met with local dignitaries of that time including Buckinghamshire High Sheriff, Richard Godber,

County Council Chairman, Richard Pushman, Buckingham Town Mayor, Robin Stuchbury and University Vice-Chancellor, Dr Terrence Kealey. He also had discussions with senior members of staff about the work of the independent university and later attended a history seminar led by Dr Jane Ridley.



# Buckingham pays respects to Queen Elizabeth II

After the death of Queen Elizabeth II, it was clear that paying respects was important to the residents of Buckingham. To accomplish this, the



Town Council organised a book of condolence at the Old Gaol Museum which was accessible every day from 10am-4pm during the official mourning period.

Several other books of condolence were available in Buckingham, with copies circulated to care homes so that residents unable to access the books could take part from their homes. The resulting entries will be bound into books and archived at Buckinghamshire Council for future historians.



Another way residents paid their respects was by leaving floral tributes at the coronation tree, near the war memorial at St Peter & St Paul's Church. The Town Council also co-ordinated putting up union flags, with mourning cravats attached, around the town centre and lowering the flags to half-mast.

On Sunday 18th September 2022, St Peter & St Paul's Church in Buckingham held a Commemorative Service. The service started with a reflection on Queen Elizabeth's life by the Vice Chancellor of the University of Buckingham, Professor James



Tooley, followed by readings and prayers given by Reverend Will Pearson Gee, Church Ministers and the Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Anja Schaefer. Hymns were sung including the late Queen's favourite hymn: Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven. The service was attended by approx. 200 people and many of those signed the book of condolence afterwards.



# Proclamation of the Accession

Buckingham announced the accession of His Majesty King Charles III, at the Reading of the Proclamation of the Accession in Buckingham.

The Deputy Mayor of Buckingham, Cllr. Anja Schaefer, travelled to Aylesbury to hear the High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire read the Proclamation of the Accession at 1pm on Sunday 11th September 2022, and collect Buckingham's copy of the Proclamation.



to Buckingham, Cllr. Anja Schaefer read the Proclamation to a large crowd that had gathered in Buckingham outside the Old Gaol at 3.30pm. The Deputy Mayor was joined by the Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Carolyn Cummings, the Town Clerk, Claire Molyneux, the Town Crier, Russell Cross, Mace Bearer, Barbara Farmer and Trumpeter, Nick Perry.

#### The Proclamation read:

Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth the Second of Blessed and Glorious Memory, by whose Decease the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland is solely and rightfully come to The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George: We, therefore, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm and Members of the House of Commons, together with other members of Her late Majesty's Privy Council and representatives of the Realms and Territories, Aldermen and Citizens of London, and others, do now hereby with one voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart publish and proclaim that The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign of Happy Memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord Charles the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of His other Realms and Territories, King, Head of the Commonwealth and Defender of the Faith.

# **WHAT IS SECTION 106?**

The annual Christmas Parade, that has a theme of 'Films', will be winding its way through the streets of **Buckingham on Saturday** 10th December 2022 from 10:45am, forming up on Chandos Road. Floats, walking groups and marching





bands will make their way through the town centre and then back to Chandos Road. A road closure organised by Buckingham Town Council will be in place until 1pm.



Once the parade is over, warm yourself up and get a hot drink at Buckingham Community Centre to visit the annual Community Fair. This event

provides a vehicle for local groups, societies, and charities to raise funds by selling Christmas cards, knitted items, plants and much more.



event open to everyone and consists of four races with different categories for children, adults and team relays. Small prizes will be given to all participants of the children's races and a small trophy for the winners. Section 106 of the Town & Country Planning Act allows Local Authorities to link planning permission to obligations on the developer in return for approval. These can be conditions on the development itself (e.g. the number of affordable houses), or may be to mitigate the impact of the development on the host community - because additional residents will create a need for more school places, leisure facilities, or public transport services. The s106 agreement could require money to be given to a school to build new classrooms, or they may be provided in kind by the developer, like the affordable housing, to be handed over to

Buckinghamshire Council (BC) for people on the housing list. It is a legal agreement between BC and the developer, and its terms must be linked to the development - BC cannot use the money for a project

elsewhere in the county.

Almost all new developments must pay for something, from a children's playground to a new school and a sports centre, like at Lace Hill. Mitigation projects must be for the general benefit of all residents, not just the new ones.

There is a similar scheme called Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), but this is not used in the north of the county yet.







S106 money (and its allied s278 for road improvements) has provided:

- Replacement equipment at almost all the town's play areas, and new play spaces in the new estates
- The survey and necessary supporting works to make part of Addington Road one-way
- · Money for the primary, secondary and special schools, the Library and Adult Learning to expand their buildings and equipment
- The expansion of the cycleway network inside and outside the town and soon the upgrade of the Scenic and Railway Walks into combined pedestrian/cycle routes with a hard surface and lighting.

# WINTER DEBT — Citizens Advice Bucks

#### Winter Cost of Living advice

There are lots of things that can be done to help you be more in control of money, even if you are already in debt. Firstly, work out how much money you have coming in and going out each month – this will help you budget and prioritise.

If you are in debts, you need to prioritise these. Citizens Advice has information on its website to help with this. Some bills can cause more problems if you do not pay – these are your priority debts such as rent and mortgage arrears, energy bills and council tax. However, you can contact the organisation you owe money to, so they can help you come up with a plan you can afford.


Check if you are entitled to any benefits. Are you getting everything you are entitled to and is the amount you are receiving correct? You can use the benefits checker on the Citizen's Advice website to see if you could be getting more support, such as benefits or government grants or to check if you are being paid correctly. Everyone will be getting a £400 grant from the government to help with energy costs, which will be credited directly to your energy supplier if you pay

by direct debit, or in prepayment vouchers if you have a meter. This will be spread over 6 monthly instalments.

Citizen's Advice is running a FREE course called Money Matters which helps you to manage your money and make it work harder for you. They have also set up a Facebook group open to all, called 'Cost of Living Crisis Support Buckinghamshire' full of tips and advice to survive through the crisis.
